TARIFF REDUCTIONS

Republicans and Democrats Satisfied on Tobacco Duties.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—From the attitude by both republican and democratic members of the house ways and means committee at today's hearing on the proposed restrictions of the tariff, it became evident that there is general satisfaction with the present duties on tobacco. The democrats appear satisfied with the present tariff on the grounds which the tobacco agent of the growers, said that should derive revenue while the republicans favor the present rates because they offer the protection desired by the American tobacco growers.

Representatives of the tobacco growers of New England, Florida and Georgia opposed any change for higher or lower rates, contending that such action would disturb the conditions of the trade.

White Floyd, chairman of the tobacco board of the Connecticut valley, was giving the committee information with regard to the various phases of the American tobacco industry and representative Griggs of Georgia, agent of the growers, said that they were afraid of free trade with the Philippines.

"They certainly are," was Mr. Floyd's reply. "Borneo and Sumatra, where the tobacco industry is in the hands of the Dutch are so near the Philippines that the Dutch tobacco growers would be able to take their coolie labor to the Philippines and raise tobacco with labor that costs but eighteen cents per pound, which would compete with our tobacco when our labor costs from \$1.50 to \$2.50 a day. It would take our standing army to keep the same growers of Sumatra from smuggling tobacco into one or more of the Philippine islands," he added. "where he could ship it to this country free of duty."

"Have you mentioned these views to Mr. Taft, the president-elect?" asked Mr. Griggs. "I have not had the pleasure of his acquaintance," was the reply.

HAVE NO PREJUDICES

LORD MILNER INTERVIEWED ON CANADIAN TOUR

DOMINION DESIRES TO TRADE WITH BRITAIN

(Canadian Associated Press)

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Lord Milner interviewed today stated that he had not discovered any prejudice against English emigrants in Canada. If it did exist the explanation must be that certain English immigrants make themselves unpopular there as there was nothing like a general feeling of dislike on the part of Canadians for immigrants from the mother country. In migration from the preferential trade there was an universal feeling in Canada in favor of it and this was not due so much to any calculation of the particular benefits which might arise to Canada as to the general sentiment in favor of trade with Britain rather than with foreign countries, especially other European countries. Canadians would not object to a duty on their imports if at a lower rate than corresponding foreign imports. However, the preferential movement in Canada had needed slightly since the present government took office. He observed a strong feeling that Canada should do more respecting imperial defence but it had not yet been taken up as a practical question. Canada had a very heavy expenditure in front of her for her own development. If the United States is in danger there would be an irresistible impulse to come to her assistance. Such assistance might not be as effective as it ought, but Canadians would desire give it.

The Morning Post says, that having won the respect and confidence of the Canadian people, Lord Milner has still further failed to be regarded by his own countrymen as pre-eminent quality.
