MANY PRELATES TO CELEBRATE

During the coming year many prelates of the Roman Catholic Church in the United States, including cardinals, archbishops, bishops and those of lesser rank, will celebrate their sacerdotal or episcopal jubilees and other milestones marking their career in the church.

Heading the list of celebrants will be the venerable Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, who on June 30 will enter upon his sixtieth year in the priesthood and on the same day will begin his thirty-fifth year as a wearer of the crimson robe and insignia of a member of the Sacred College of Cardinals.

Only a few years behind the venerable Baltimore prelate in point of service in the priesthood is the Rt. Rev. Thomas O'Gorman, bishop of Sioux Falls, who on November 5, will reach the fifty-fifth anniversary of his ordination as a priest.

Two bishops will celebrate their sacerdotal golden jubilees during the year. They are Bishop Schwegel of La Crosse and Bishop Eis of Marquette, both of whom were ordained half a century ago.

Bishop Koudelka of Superior, Bishop Beaven of Springfield, Mass., and Bishop Burke of St. Joseph, Mo., will celebrate their forty-fifth anniversary in the priesthood.

On May 22nd, Rt. Rev. John P. Farrelly, bishop of Cleveland, and Rt. Rev. Michael J. Hoban, bishop of Scranton, will complete forty years in the priesthood. Later in the year a similar anniversary will be observed by Rt. Rev. John J. Monaghan, head of the Wilmington, Del., diocese.

Among the prelates who will celebrate their thirty-fifth ordination anniversary during the year are Archbishop Hanna of San Francisco, and Bishops Donahue of Wheeling, Lillis of Kansas City, McDermott of Harrisburg, and Lawler of Lead, S. Dak.

The thirtieth anniversary of their ordination will be celebrated by Most Rev. Dennis J. Dougherty, archbishop of Philadelphia; Rt. Rev. Cornelius Van de Ven, bishop of Alexandria, La., and Rt. Rev. John E. Gunn, bishop of Natchez, Miss.

The Most Rev. George V. Mundelein, archbishop of Chicago, will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination on June 8. Other prelates who will observe their silver jubilee in the priesthood are bishop McGovern of Cheyenne and Bishop McGrath of Baker City.

Bishop Lynch of Trenton will celebrate the twentieth anniversary of their ordination.

In June the Rt. Rev. Benjamin J. Kelley will celebrate his twentieth anniversary as bishop of Savannah and in November the Rt. Rev. Herman J. Storing will complete his second decade of service as head of the diocese of Port Wayne.

During the year the following prelates will round out ten years of service at the head of their respective dioceses: Bishops O'Donnell of Louisville, Helfron of Winona, Corbett of Crookston, O'Reilly of Fargo, Nilan of Hartford, Rice of Burlington, Vt., and Wehle of Bismarck, N. Dak.

NO "GENERAL" REVISION

Sir Henry Drayton Holds Conference With Bankers on Financial Situation.

Ottawa, Dec. 13.—(Staff Special).—Sir Henry Drayton's promised announcement on the subject of tariff inquiry was not forthcoming after today's Cabinet Council though the matter was before the meeting.

Sir George Foster stated however, that arrangements had been made for collecting the information requisite for dealing with the subject.

It is well understood here that at the next session there will be no "general" revision, if the tariff is tackled at all, but meanwhile the process of collecting data and receiving representations on the fiscal question will be initiated.

The Minister of Finance is conferring this afternoon of the financial and exchange situation with a delegation of the Canadian Bankers' Association.

ALEX. PATTERSON DEAD.

Treasurer of Masonic Relief Board More Than 30 Years.

Toronto has lost one of her oldest residents, in the person of Alexander Patterson, J.P., who died at his home, 23 Parkwood avenue, Born eighty-five years ago, in Belfast, Ireland, he was a resident in Toronto for about sixty years.

Prominent in Masonic circles, he had officiated as treasurer of the Masonic Relief Board of Canada for more than thirty years, was the oldest Past Master and member of Wilson Masonic Lodge, having been a member for over fifty-four years. In Grand Lodge he held the rank of Past Grand Registrar, and was Past Grand Superintendent of Toronto District, No. 8, Royal Craft Masonry.

Deceased, who was a personal friend of Sir John Macdonald, was once president of the old St. James Ward Conservative Association.

Rev. Olympia Brown, the noted woman pioneer preacher and suffragist and who now makes her home in Wisconsin, held a pastorate some fifty years ago in Bridgeport, Conn., and numbered among her parishioners P. T. Barnum, the famous showman.

With the death of ex-Empress Eugenie, now in her ninety-fourth year, her namesake and favorite, Queen Victoria Eugenie of Spain is expected to inherit what is said to be one of the finest private collections of jewels in the world.

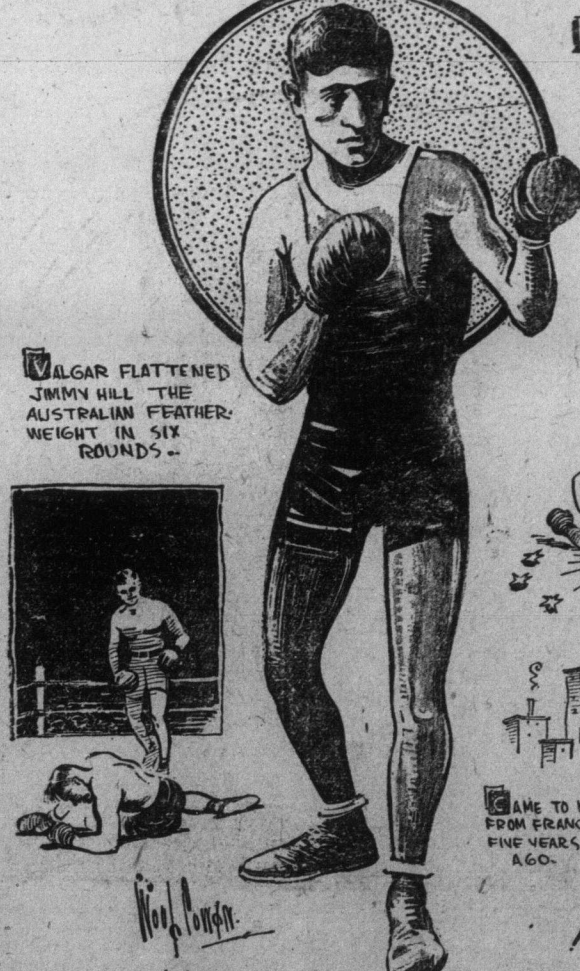
