some of the points about procedure in this matter, but of course we were at that time waiting for the replies from the provinces to the white paper and the accompanying letter which we had sent to them.

I would like to look into that situation. I think all the replies are in, or all but one perhaps, and I hope my hon. friend will permit the Minister of Justice or myself to make a statement on this matter, as soon as I have had a chance to look into the provincial situation, tomorrow or the next day, I hope.

Mr. Brewin: I wonder whether I can ask the Prime Minister a supplementary question. Has consideration been given to enlarging the ambit of any inquiry to take into its scope the whole question of constitutional amendment and not just amending procedures?

Mr. Pearson: We will look into that matter too, Mr. Speaker; but I hope my hon. friend will agree that the procedure which we should follow in the house in respect of this very important matter must be related to the steps taken by the provinces on the same question. It is a difficult and complicated question, and that is why I am asking for a few hours delay before I reply.
