The Peel Board of Education and elementary school teacher negotiators are about \$3 million apart in their respective proposals for a 1978-79 con-

The two negotiating teams exchanged position papers Thursday at a press conference in the central board office.

Elementary teachers are seeking an increase in salaries and benefits totalling 13 per cent, which would add more than \$6 million to the present \$51 million contract. The proposal excrement.

Elementary teachers in Peel felt that the difference in the secondary and elementary salary grid (pay scale) was unjustified and should be eliminated. Therefore the emphasis is in the area of the salary grid," said John Cruikshank, chairman of the elementary teachers' negotiating

Cruikshank explained that the teachers are demanding a 2.9 per cent increase for some elementary teachers to bring them in line with their secondary school counterparts.

Kent said that salaries for elemen tary school teachers in Peel compare favorably with those in other boards and added that Peel is second highest paying of the 20 largest school boards in the province


