I have felt that what I should like to speak to you about this afternoon is "Canada and the World of Today", or more accurately, "Some Thoughts concerning Canada and the World of Today". Moreover, it is hardly probable I shall again have an opportunity to speak to so many of you with whom my early life was closely associated, or to your children. I am anxious that my words may carry with them some thoughts which may be worthy of your remembrance, as we pursue our way through the vast uncertainties of our times. Though the subject I have chosen may be a very large one, I shall deal with only one or two aspects of it. They will be the ones to which I attach most importance. It is to the younger generation, who have the future to face, that I wish especially to speak this afternoon. I shall strive to make . what I say as little involved as possible.
