HEAD ST. WEST

Head St. West is the worst piece of street in the city. This is due to two causes—no sewer and shade trees. One might almost add another—lack of enterprise on the part of the citizens. Initiative steps were taken, but a petition sufficiently signed was put in against the work and it was stopped for two years. In the spring and fall, water lies on this street, making it not only unhealthy but impassable.

Queen street ratepayers, that is the majority of them, are highly in favor of a new pavement for their thoroughfare. There are at present two petitions for pavements, one for bitulithic, the first and one for brick. The bitulithic was sufficiently signed, then the brick petition came out and some who had signed the first signed the second one, too, and a few of those speak of going back to the bitulithic again.

"I'd like to see a bitulithic pavement," said Wm. Potter this morning. "Travelers from London say that it is the best pavement London has. Then there's so much brick going down that I'd prefer something else for Queen."

W. M. Brider, who is a pretty heavy Queen street ratepayer, says, "Brick pavements are awfully hard on the horses' knees and this bitulithic pavement makes almost a perfect street for driving one. All the traffic would come right down Queen street if it were paved."

A committee from the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association, Port Huron, was in the city to-day. Every year this association runs an excursion, and Mayor McKeough has succeeded in interesting them in Chatham and it is quite possible that they will come to this city this year. They have held excursions to Detroit, Bay City, Saginaw and London. They were in London last year and had a crowd of 2,200 people. The excursion this year will be held on or about the 22nd of August.

Mayor McKeough and Ald. Piggott entertained the committee to-day and drove them about the city. The visitors were very much impressed with Chatham and thought that it would be an ideal place for a picnic. Should they decide on this city, the presence of such a large crowd will be a great thing for Chatham.

"Chatham is a very fine town," remarked one of the delegates, "and is far above my expectations.
