LATE HON. H. T. DUFFY.

His Colleagues to Attend the Funeral.

Quebec, July 6.—Premier Parent and the Cabinet colleagues of the late Hon. H. T. Duffy have sent an elaborate floral offering to South Durham, to be exposed in the mortuary chamber there. It is a magnificent piece of work, in the shape of a pillow. It is four feet in length, of white roses, carnations and lilies.

Hon. Mr. Parent and members of the Provincial Government left on Sunday for South Durham to be present at the obsequies of their late Cabinet colleague to-morrow morning.

It is said that Hon. Mr. Duffy leaves an estate worth between \$75,000 and \$80,000, the disposition of which will not be known until the will is read after the funeral. Among the many honors bestowed upon Hon. Mr. Duffy during his lifetime was his appointment to represent the Provincial Government at the coronation of King Edward VII.

RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS.

Notice by the Trustees of Forthcoming Elections.

Montreal, July 6.—A memorandum has been sent out by the trustees of the Cecil Rhodes will for the information of college authorities and intending candidates for scholarships in Canada. The first election of scholars in Canada under the Rhodes bequest will be made between February and May, 1904, and those elected will commence residence at Oxford in 1904. Qualifying examinations are to be held with in this period. The universities of the various Provinces will make nominations in rotation. In Ontario nominations will be made by Toronto University in 1904, and Queen's in 1905.

SWITCHMAN KILLED.

Charles Hodgins Caught in a Frog at Windsor.

Windsor, July 6.—Charles Hodgins, a switchman in the Grand Trunk yards here, met death in a horrible form last night. He had just given a signal to the engineer of one of the yard engines to back down when his foot was caught in an open frog directly in front of the engine. There was no one near at the time, and on account of escaping steam, the engineer failed to hear his cries to stop. The wheels passed entirely over his body, which was ground literally into a pulp. Hodgins was 23 years of age, and unmarried. Coroner Bell, who was called, has empanelled a jury and will hold an inquest to-morrow evening.
