A Copy of a Despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies relating to Crown Lands that may be required for the purpose of Railways through this Province.

Extract of a Despatch from the Right Honorable Earl Grey to Sir William Colebrooke, dated [No. 24.]

Downing Street, 24th October, 1846.

SIR,—I have received your Despatch, No. 92, of the 29th September, &c. &c. I think it right to state that I approve of your suggestion not to sanction the alienation of any of the Crown Lands in New Brunswick which may be required for the purpose of the Railway, or which are likely to be raised in value in consequence of the Rail Road passing through them. You will therefore give directions to the Officers of the Crown Land Department to avoid disposing of any such Lands at present, except with a distinct reservation of the power of the Crown to resume any portion of them which may be required for the Railway. It will also be desirable that purchasers should be compelled, in the event of the Railway passing within five miles, at their option either to surrender the Land sold to them, receiving payment for improvements, or to pay an additional price for it, according to arbitration.
