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## gerohase of The selirlrk Estate.

Hon. Cod GRAY-It is mat naceaytry to repeat my approwal of the priaciple of the Land Purchase Bill, and wy objectiona of the mode in which it tas been worked. Hi fave for the Houde to consider the proprity of the Goverument chtermining the proposition of the Bart of Selkitk, and of pulting them in a position to accept it by enfarging ita poaitions of the BHI. I zegret that my hos. colleague, Mr. Douse, je not presemt, as it would be desirable to bave the benefit of his mimate knowlodge of the Etate, in the matagement of whith he has been hong engaged.

Mr. COOPER-Lord Sethirk gave in his adhesion to the Commiesion to which the proposal should be reierred. The fuperial Government knows that it has done wrong, and they ahould bear a portion of the cosit of repairing the injury.

Hon. Mr. Haviland-Does the hon member imagine that the Commissionera would recommend terma as liberalas those offered by Lurd Seisirk? It would be ridiculoas to reject sach a proposal. If we allow the present golden opportunty to pass taimproved, the Main which leaves hers on Monday next will take home offers from private individuals, sad midelemen will step between the Government and the detchers, ta in the case of the Worrel Eetate, Supposing that the Commiesion should declate the lamds forfeted to the Orown, hey would not be given to the people gratis, but would form a source of Revenue.

Mir COOPER-.We are ashed to pay abost $£ 8,000$, when there is a prospect of receiving money from the Briish Goverument, whose suggeation of the Cummission was an admision that they had done wrong. The management of the property, the burveys, and watching of the timber, \&c., would dowitie the price to the tenant.

Hon. Mr. Wightman-Are we jusifined in declining their ofter, and allowing onters to become the purchasers for 3s. 64 . currency per acre? My opiaion is, that we should embsuce the oppurianity; and thas avoid one of the causes which enhanced the cost of the Worrell Estate. Loi 31 might have been purchased by the lais Government, had not the agent interfered, and, representing the Government as unable to purchase it, bought it ininself at 4s. 4 d . sterling per acre, and, I am in' formed, now aske 40 shllings an ace. Hod the Government purchased that Lols the tegants would hove tad more advantageone terms, sud in the case of the Selkuk property, it is ide to expect a mure fibecal proposal. When the arreara of sent are remitted the peoplo will be encouraged to buy the freeholds, and the propery will be setted.

Hon, Mr. YEO-The offer is so low that no one can expect more advantagevus terms. The Goverament can get he property for less than half what the Worell Estate cost.
Several members spoke yery briefly, recommending the asceptance of Loud Seikirl's offer, and Hon. Col. Gray having submilted a resuluton for increasing the anoum at presemt fimited for the operation of the Land Purcbase Bill by $£ 10,000$,

Hon. Mr. CULAL' - The Govermment now pruposes to purchase 48,000 acres of land, in addition to the Worrel Estate, and to enable thern to effect that object they are nbont to increase the scope of the Lavd Purchase Bill. They are thus zdopting the phthey of the late Government; and had not they and their friende used heir influence to pravera the Loan Bill becoming law, money sufficient to buy as all the proprietary titles could have been obiained at probably less than 4 per cent, whereas the peopie will hate to pay 6 under present circum stances. A great diference of opinion had taken place in the minds of the Government and their supporters since the time when they denounced the idea of impoang a anx for the purpose of converting the leasehold inte a freehold tenure. Now, it seems that they have no wich objection. As to the management of the Worrell Estate and the amount realized from it, up so the present time, Ido not anticipase that the settlers on the Selkirk property will be willing to pay very highly for their lands. In fact the moss valunble are alseady held in freehold. The threarened interposition of private syeculators unless the offer be accepted before Monday, is not entitled to much congideration, as an argumens for the House hastily closing with this ofer, which has beea prompted more by regard to the ques-
tion of guit Rente thait ataything elie. Tho Govermmat whould yefer the offer to the Canmission, to whith is would be a guide in entimating the value to be putupon other propertiest and they might possibly get the guaratee of of lom for a gerev ral parchase, which would save a large amount of interest. I an opposed to the extention of the Lend Puchace Bil, satit he Imperial Guarmee shall havo been oubained for a foar, befure whichat will be found that 830,000 beaving six per sent
 object.
Hon. Col. GRAE-E have not ahtered mg opinion on the subject of the Luan Bill, which, if tranteds wold have had disastrous effece apon the Colony; for if the resulta of the hanied operations competed with the parchase and disposal of The Worell Eethe anve been au unsativiactory, the contol and management of 100,000 stering would have beed far more prejudicial ia their consequences.

Hon. Mr, LONGWORTE-I am not arpriseat be be:sistency of the hon. meater. The worder woult be, that he should swerve from the paith he has trodernat lung. Whea hes says that it is wrong to assume say debt on arcount of the purchase of this propery, and that the offer moudid be referred to the Commission, does he expect that bether terms white oulained by wainng? The fucs is, I believe, he would wot secept the free transfer of the fand, if ita accepance myolved the loss of ha pecupation of agituling the question of Liecheat. It that were graned, and if the lands were declased forfetted, they cowid not be afforded to the people for wach less than the price at which they are now ofiered. 1 dony that the majurisy are justy chargeable with incusistency in shucanag the acceptance of this offer. Our objecion was mot the principio, but to the worling of the Land Purchase Bhll, with seference to the Worrell Listate. Had the price given for it mat beenso high, and the classification of the best lands ao very low, that property might have been self-susaining. Io tot wonder at the opposition of the hon member, Mr. Coles, it is butaral that he should not be pleased at the prospect of such a propery as the Selbirk Etate passing imo the hands of the presem Goverament, at a proce no low that they can settie the peopie in freehuid wihnut imposing burders on the general puohe, for if ordibary pradence be observed, the whole amoun or prineipal, imereshad cost of management will be realized in eyghe or kea years.

Hon Mr. COLES, having brietly recapitulated his objectors to the proposed action of the House, and submhed an minend ment expressive of bis views, was followed by the
Hon. Mr. POPLE-The how member opposes the purehase for fear that the Goverment thay obtais credit for the benefita they will confer upou the people. Hia usserton that the majority opposed his taxation for the purpuse of converting tenams int freeholders, is true, and he affars of the worell Estate justify the opposition, whle had the late Guvermment succeeded in obsaining the loan they tried for, I believe the Colony would have been ruined. Such an opmion is but a legitimate inference from their management of the Worrell Lstate. The present Government is in a pasition very different from that of their predecessors; they do not intend to send parties to report upon the deBirability of effecting a purchase, on the completion of which depend the livings of the very parties employed to examine and report upon the property. There is nothing to prevent the Selkirk property being self-sustaining, for while the rents amount to upwards of 21400 , the interset or the frat cosl whil be only E 400 angually. The Hon, Leader of the Opposition said last night that it would be a good bargain, and shouid be accepted as a compensation for the Worrell Estate, but now opposes it, and refers the ofer to the Commis. sion, on the deliberations of which I believe the offer of Lord Selkirk wilh have a good effect. I am happy to bear teatimony to the fact that the hon meaber, Col. Gray; is antited to the Whole credt of the offer having been made; and the people of Belfast have cause to be grateful for his ewertions in theis behalf.
