Commentary—I: Israel's armies defited (17:1-11). The armies of the Philistines and of the Israelites were facing each other in a narrow part of the valley of Elah. The crests of the hills are about a mile apart and five or six hundred feet high. One army occupied the highland on the north and the other the highland on the south. For one army to leave its place of defence and descend into the plain and ascend the hill on the other side would be to give the other army an advantage and invite defeat. Each army waited thus day affer day hoping that the other would do so. At last the Philistines challenged the Israelites to decide the struggle by single combat. They named Gollath as their champion, we offered to fight

their champion, we offered to fight any one of Isreal. It was probable that he was of the remnant of Anakim, nearly all of whom Joshua destroyed, which mant became identified with the Phillistines. Gollath was from eight to ten feet in height. The cubit is the length of the forearm from the tip-of the middle finger to the point of the elbow, hence varies so much that the cubit is said to be from sixteen to twenty-one inches. He wore metallic armor weighing from ninety to one hundred and fitty pounds.

12. Jamieson concludes that the events of the lesson occurred about twenty-seven years after the Philistine overthrow at Michmash. They occurred about eleven miles southwest of Jerusalem, and appear to have been the conclusion of a long campaign. Saul's culminating act of disobdelience, and consequent rejection, appear to have been followed by a fresh assault and invasion on the part of the Patilistines (17; 1). To complete his preparation for his future dignity. David was introduced to the associations of court life.
