TOKIO CITY ALARMED

Incessant Arrival of Russian Troops Dismayed Population.

This Feature of the News Indicates War's Approach—Russia's Reply in the Hands of Admiral Alexieff, Who Will Present It to Japanese Government When Opportune Moment Arrives—Hoping for Peace.

London, Jan. 5.—Despatches from the Far East say market prices in Tokio have fallen rapidly. A despatch from Vladivostok reports the departure of a Russian cruiser, presumably for Port Arthur, and the impending departure of four other cruisers, while the population is alarmed at the incessant arrival of Russian troops.

Still Hopes for Peace.

Paris, Jan. 5.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Paris edition of The New York Herald says that the reply of the Russian Government to the Japanese Government is now in the hands of Admiral Alexieff, the Russian Viceroy in the Far East, who will deliver it when he considers a fitting moment has arrived. According to the correspondent Viceroy Alexieff says that Russia has not given up hope of a peaceful settlement of the difficulties. The correspondent adds: "As to whether Russia's reply will be acceptable to Japan, no one here will express an opinion. The reply has been carefully considered and from Russia's point of view is framed in terms which Japan can honorably accept."

Torpedo Boats Sailed.

Malta, Jan. 5.—Five Russian torpedo boat destroyers sailed from here yesterday in an eastward direction.

From Russian Source.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 5.—The Japanese Minister here, M. Kurino, has authorized the Associated Press to say that he had a cordial conference with Foreign Minister Lamsdorff on Friday last, and that he was convinced by the latter's sincere conciliatory attitude that the Russian Government is disposed to seek a peaceful settlement.

From German Source.

Cologne, Germany, Jan. 5.—"The tension between Russia and Japan has appreciably decreased, and the situation is regarded in authoritative quarters as quite reassuring," according to a despatch to The Cologne Gazette from St. Petersburg, "although the preparations and strategic deployment of both armies will not immediately be interrupted," adds the correspondent, "pending the negotiations taking a turn affording the best prospects of Russia coming to a complete understanding with Japan."

Wishes Marines Ready for Fight.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The United States Navy Department has been advised by cable of the arrival yesterday at Chemulpo of the transport Zafro from Manila, with a company of marines. If advised, the marines will march to Seoul to protect the American legation.

Prayed for Peace.

Washington, Jan. 5.—At the opening of the House yesterday the chaplain prayed for peace between Japan and Russia.

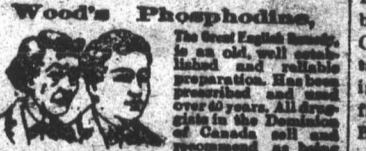
