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MOTHERWELL GUARDS AGAINST ANOTHER FUEL SHORTAGE AS RESULT OF REPRESENTATIONS MADE BY SASKATCHEWAN GOVERNMENT C.P.R. HAS UNDERTAKEN TO SUPPLY AMPLE ROLLING STOCK TO MOVE COAL DURING SUMMER, AND GALT PEOPLE OFFER SUBSTANTIAL INDUCEMENTS TO DEALERS TO LAY IN STOCKS OF COAL.

It will be remembered that a conference took place a few weeks ago in Winnipeg between Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Commissioner of Agriculture for Saskatchewan, William Whyte, representing the C. P. R. and several representatives of western coal companies. The object of the conference was to try and effect some arrangement between coal operators, railway companies and dealers whereby a recurrence of the fuel famine of last winter might be prevented.

The letter referred to is from the Alberta Railway and Irrigation company, which is dated June 29, read as follows: "Referring to the conference we had in Winnipeg a short time ago regarding the fuel question in the Province of Saskatchewan, you will remember that I promised that every effort would be made by this company to supply its shares of the coal required for the coming winter, and that arrangements would be made by the company to store, during the summer months, as much coal throughout the province as it was at all possible."

Mr. Motherwell Takes Action The following is a copy of the letter addressed by the Commissioner of Agriculture to the coal operators. It is dated Regina, July 8: "I have no doubt that after the West's experience in fuel shortage last winter, you are fully alive to the importance of having as much coal stockpiled up by the dealers and their customers during the summer months as the transportation companies can handle or the miners can turn out."

HUNDREDS TRY HERBS FOR CANCER TWO "SPECIALISTS" IN WELSH VILLAGE HAVE HANDS FULL TREATING DISEASE CARDIGAN, Wales, July 14.—That the claims of the Evans brothers, the herbalist cancer specialists, have been taken seriously by people from all parts of England, Scotland and Wales is readily believed by any one now visiting this picturesque town. Last February there were about fifty cases in Cardigan. Cases of all kinds were accepted, and the disease included rodent ulcer, lupus, polyp of the nose, epithelioma of the lip and tongue and true scirrhus of the breast.

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GHASTLY FIND BY MONTREAL BOATMAN VICTORIA FIRE LOSS TOTALS \$250,000

MAN FISHED OUT OF RIVER WITH THROAT SLASHED FROM EAR TO EAR MONTREAL, July 24.—Cut open to within an inch of both ears the gaping throat of a man whose body was found floating down the river near Pointe Aux Trembles at 11 o'clock this afternoon presents another case of either suicide or crime. This ghastly discovery was made by Joseph Giroux, Pointe Aux Trembles, while rowing in the river engaged in picking up pieces of wood floating on the water. Rowing up to it he was first attracted by the blood on the dead man's face and lifting the body out of the water he saw that the throat was deep and jagged. The wound measured within several inches long. Floating within several yards of the corpse were a straw hat and an empty razor case, which might point to suicide or murder.

DROWNED AT MOOSOMIN Frank Cole Took Cramps While Bathing in the Pipestone

MOOSOMIN, July 24, 1907.—On Sunday last Frank Cole was drowned in the Pipestone while bathing. It seems that the young man took a cramp while in a deep pool and by the time he was got to the bank it was too late for artificial respiration to be of any use. E. A. C. IMMENSE COAL DISCOVERY HAZLETON, Pa., July 24.—The Lehigh Valley Coal Co. has opened what is believed to be the world. It is located at Lattin, Pa. and the coal is in a solid bed 1,000 feet thick and extends from Lattin to Drifton, at least six miles. It is estimated that it will take out 500 tons daily it would require 250 years to exhaust the supply.

CABINET MEETING AT OTTAWA No Reprieve for Cappelli—Sir Wilfrid Keeps His Promise

OTTAWA, Ont., July 24.—There was a meeting of the cabinet this afternoon. An order in council was passed allowing the law to take its course in the case of Cappelli, the Italian who stabbed and killed another Italian at Perry Sound in a row. Cappelli will be hanged on August 10. The Premier has lost no time in carrying out his promise made to the citizens of Ottawa on the night of his arrival from England to not proceeding with the new central railway station and hotel. The Premier has had conference with C. M. Hays and William Walwright of the Grand Trunk and also with Mayor Scott and expects that the work will commence early. The railway commission has prepared an order calling on all the companies operating in Canada to make the same rates for their agreements on through tariff rates with connecting lines at certain points, and also asking them if they are willing to quote the same rates for other alternate routes, and if they are not, they are asked to give reasons.

ROOM IN CANADA FOR WOMEN TOO WHY DO NOT THE WOMEN OF KERISOVA FOLLOW THE CALL AS WELL?

BUDAPEST, July 24.—The lure of the United States and Canada, as lands of opportunity and wealth to the people of Kerisova, has brought about a curious state of affairs in the little village of Kerisova, near Lugos which at the last census had a population of 2,500 souls. One by one the male residents of Kerisova have followed the call across the water and they have emigrated in batches, until such time as the Mayor was obliged to make the women of Kerisova have just elected a young woman to the position of Mayor and other female residents have been elected to fill the remainder of the municipal offices.

CONSUMPTION CURED BY AIR AND WORK GRATIFYING RESULTS FOLLOW SERIES OF EXPERIMENTS AT SANITARIUM

LONDON, July 24.—That tuberculosis in its early stage can be cured by fresh air, sunlight and a graduated system of outdoor work is being demonstrated at the Brompton Hospital Sanitarium at Primley. The patients of the sanitarium are all selected cases of tuberculosis in its first stages, who have been carefully examined and watched for some weeks at the Brompton Hospital. After their arrival at Primley the patients do no work until their temperatures have been normal for some days. Then they begin on the first grade of outdoor work, which consists of simply walking about the grounds. From this they work up to doing severe manual labor, such as digging trenches in previously unbroken ground. The treatment usually lasts about six months. Of the cases transferred to the sanitarium last year, 110 were discharged with "total arrest of disease," twenty-one "much improved," and twenty-five "improved." Of these cases 113 are at work, nineteen are not, and three have died. Everywhere throughout the grounds the patients are at work: the women at gardening, cutting the grass, etc.; the men, some at their various trades under shade and others in building a concrete reservoir and sawing firewood, etc. Among the work accomplished by the patients since the opening of the sanitarium may be mentioned the excavating of the walls of the reservoir and mixing and laying about 650 tons of concrete, making paths and laying concrete walks, building a subway between two of the buildings and cutting into firewood about 100 tons.

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CONGO WOMEN CRUELLY TREATED BELGIAN OFFICER PRODUCES A STATEMENT OF BRUSSELS, July 24.—Major Leclair, the Belgian officer, who was formerly in the service of the Congo, has issued an independent statement, and who has lately published sensational statements regarding the revolting conditions in the Congo, has issued another installment of his story. He produces a statement from six native women, who were subjected to ill treatment and then sold at Nitinga post, and who then saw their children killed before their eyes.
