Not only do Messrs. Scott and Rutherford now oppose that argument; they ask for more extended

Of course they are right in their contention that the provinces should administer the school lands. The contention that Alberta and Saskatchewan could not be entrusted with the administration of the public domain was ridiculous; worse than that it was a libel upon the capability and vinces. But that counted for little when the fate of the Scott and Ruth-

erford governments hung in the balance. They would "swallow" or defend anything in the form of arguments, no matter how unpalatable or ridiculous they might be, provided that by so doing support could be
