—We publish a few notes from Inspector Hodgson's report on our High School.—Present value of reference library, \$485.10, additions of \$20.45 have been made during the year; sup., read., English literature library, \$63.02, same as last year; apparatus, \$375.60; maps, globes, etc., \$68.95, addition of \$8.40 having been made; drawing models, \$10.00, same as last year; equipment for physical education, \$4, same as last year. The school premises are in good condition; there is no provision for physical training but in other departments school fulfils requirements; staff, qualified; discipline, excellent; attendance in accordance with the regulations; the school is well organized and administered. . . . I think the board fortunate in having secured the services of Mr. Anderson, he is energetic and accurate in his work.
