WAS A HOT RETREAT

How the Canadians Fought to Save a Gun.

They Were Successful but it was Rather a Cost'y Fight.

London. January 10 .- Reuter sends

the following:-The sharp fighting in the Komati valley, near Belfast, on Nov. 6 was marked by some plucky work by Gen. Smith-Dorrien's Canadians, who formed the rear guard, and foiled a most determined aftempt by the Boer's to capture a gun. The following detials of the action are given by a

Canadian officer: —
The rear guard under command of The rear guard under command of Leut. Col. Lessard, consisted only of 70 Royal Canadian Dragoons, with a Colt gun and two guns of "D" Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, and soon became most closely pressed by the enemy, Boers showing themselves everywhere, and coming on with the

greatest determination.

At 10.40 a. m., seeing that the baggage and infantry were at a safe distance, the rean guard began, to full back, and as they did so the Boers became more and more aggressive, but the accurate and steady fire from the guns and the bold front of the Dra-

goons kept them at a distance. The accurate knowledge of the country and folds of the ground which Boers have all through the war been acknowledged to possess stood them in good stead on this occasion, for some undreds of them, taking advantage of a dip in the ground running up from the Komati, had collected directly in mear of our rear guard, and, thinking their opportunity had arrived, gallop-ed out firing wildly from their horses as they charged, their object being to capture the guns.

It was at this juncture that the greatest gallantry was displayed by the Canadians. The guns rapidly fixed seem half dozen rounds at the advancsoem half dozen rounds at the advanc-ing enemy, then limbered up, and re-tired as fast as their now thoroughly tired horses would allow them, and two troops Royal Canadian Dragoons, under Lieut. Cockburn and Sergt, Suilder covered their retirement, sur-rificing themselves by fighting on till hose who were not killed or wounded were captured by an overwhelming

By this action the Canadian cavalry saved the Canadian guns.

For the next two hours a running fight was kept up, till at 1.30 p, m. the Boers made a most dashing and the Boers made a most dashing and determined effort to secure our guns, galloping to within two hundred yards of them, but only to be driven off by a squadron of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, under Lieut, Turner. Just at this time, the Colt gun, which has been doing most excellent service in covering the retirement of the field guns, was almost surrounded by the enemy. The gun was in action up to the last moment and the horse was so played out that to attempt to

was so played out that to attempt to retire with the gun and carriage would have been useless.

So, with the greatest presence of mind and coolness, Sergt. Holland, R. C. D., whis had charge of the gun, detached the barrel from the carriage placed it under his arm, and, mounting is horse, rode off with it; under a hail of Boer bullets.
