WAS A HOT RETREAT.

How the Canadians Fought to Save a Gun.

They Were Successful but it was Rather a Costly Fight.

London, January 10.—Reuter sends the following:—
The sharp fighting in the Komati valley, near Belfast, on Nov. 6 was marked by some plucky work by Gen. Smith-Dorrien's Canadians, who formed the rear guard, and foiled a determined attempt by the Boers to capture a gun. The following details of the action are given by a Canadian officer:—
The rear guard under command of Lieut.-Col. Leeseur, consisted only of 70 Royal Canadian Dragoons, with a Colt gun and two guns of "D" Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, and soon became most closely pressed by the enemy. The Boers, showing themselves everywhere, and coming on with the greatest determination.

At 10.40 a. m., seeing that the baggage and ammunition were at a safe distance, the rear guard began to fall back, and as they did so the Boers became more and more aggressive, but the accurate and steady fire from the guns and the bold front of the Dragoons kept them at a distance.

The accurate knowledge of the country and folds of the ground and the fact that the Boers had collected their men in good stead on this occasion, for some hundreds of them, taking advantage of a dip in the ground, running up from the rear guard, and thinking their opportunity had arrived, galloped out firing wildly from their horses as they charged, their object being to capture the guns.

It was at this juncture that the greatest gallantry was displayed by the Canadians. The guns rapidly fired seven half dozen rounds at the advancing enemy, then limbered up, and retired as fast as their own thoroughly tired horses would allow them. Two troops Royal Canadian Dragoons, under Lieut. Cockburn and Sergt. Snider covered their retirement, sacrificing themselves by fighting on till those who were not killed or wounded were captured by an overwhelming force.

By this action the Canadian cavalry saved the Canadian guns.
For the next two hours a running fight was kept up, till at 1.30 p. m. the Boers made a most daring and determined effort to secure our guns, galloping to within a hundred yards of them, but only to be driven off by a squadron of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, under Lieut. Turner.

Just at this time, the Colt gun, which has been doing most excellent service in covering the retirement of the field guns, was almost surrounded by the enemy. The gun was in action up to the last moment and the horse was played out that it attempted to retire with the gun and carriage would have been useless.

So, with the greatest presence of mind and coolness, Sergt. Holland, R. C. D., who had charge of the gun, detached the barrel from the carriage placed it under his arm, and mounting in horse, rode off with it, under a hail of Boer bullets.

NEW HEAD OF THE ARMOURS.

J. Ogden Doesn't Believe in Working Himself Into an Early Grave.

Chicago, Jan. 10.—J. Ogden Armour, who succeeds to the management of his father's vast business interests, is physically if not mentally wholly unlike his father.
