FOR THE BUNGALOW A Few Suggestions For Appropriate

For those who are planning to build a bungalow or cottage here are a few suggestions. It is not supposed for a moment that every woman who has become interested in home handicraft can do all of these things unaided. Some can, for the things are not very hard. But those who cannot do all the work themselves can surely do the thinking part and by the aid of a very ordinary workman achieve any of the objects here described. The bungalow to which we refer is to be built of un finished logs, and straight young sap-lings or the straight limbs of older trees are chosen as a material for interior decoration.
Unfinished timbers are used to very

good advantage as a grill, and they look well, too, in other than log houses. To make the grill seen in the picture two slightly curved branches three or four inches in diameter were selected. Strip the outside of it with birch bark, when it will be ready for the base. It seems unnecessary to give dimensions, as each one can decide this for herself, according to the space or place it is to occupy.—Good Housekeeping.


A Family Menu Card A Californian housekeeper has adopted a novel idea she calls a "menu sug-
