
JUDGE WOODS PASSES AWAY AFTER LONG AND USEFUL LIFE

He Was Well Known As A Good Man And A Good Citizen—He Lived An Exemplary Life And His Demise will be Deeply Mourned

GRAPHIC SKETCH OF HIS VERY EVENTFUL CAREER

Judge Woods, probably the best known, and certainly one of the most highly respected men in this western district, passed peacefully away at Hotel Santa this morning, after an extended illness. He has been confined to his room for several weeks, and it has been known for some time that the end was near. He was 87 years and 30 days old, but his mind retained its brightness till the end. The funeral will take place on Thursday at 2.30, from Christ Church to the Maple Leaf Cemetery. The church will be opened at one o'clock to allow any of the friends to view the remains. Besides his aged widow, he leaves two daughters and two sons. His daughter time when the circuit was 150 miles in length, and two weeks were required for the work. In 1850 he came to Kent and at once took his place among those interested in the advancement and development of this section. His means and his energies have been freely given to the securing of railways, good roads, canals and other enterprises. To him is due the forcing of the Hamilton citizens into the construction of the Great North Western Railway, which, with the opening of the Michigan Central to Chicago, became the link between the roads of the east and west.

Judge Woods had never belonged

to any secret society. While a faithful member of the church of England, he had a broad sympathy for all other denominations, and was liberal in his aid to further any of them in good work. He was a member of the Church of England Synod, and an earnest advocate of temperance, and of the legislation to promote it. For some time he was president of the Kent Branch of the Dominion Alliance, and he had been connected with other organizations having similar intent.

In politics he was a Conservative, first and last, and was proud of the fact that his allegiance to his party had never wavered, even while his personal relations with the leaders of the opposition had ever been most cordial. In 1854 he contested Kent against Larwill, McKellar and Waddell, when Larwill was returned, and Mr. Woods was defeated on the secularization of the clergy reserve, which question he was in advance of his party.

In 1849 the late Judge Woods was united in marriage to Emma Elizabeth, first and last, and was the Hon. John E. Schwarz, Adj. Gen. of the State of Michigan. Since the advent of the year 1904, Judge Woods had retired from the Junior Judgeship, followed by the good wishes of all his legal brethren, whose admiration for his honorable career, and reverence for his high character were unbounded. His public career covered an important and historic period in the province, and his reminiscences of the conditions of the people a lifetime ago, were of great interest. His volume, "Harrison Hall and Its Associations," gives the history of the district from the earliest organization, with that of their municipal, judicial, political and educational interests. He was a fine conversationalist, and was by nature most social, and time spent in his society was never devoid of pleasure.
