The landlady could hear her lodger hour after hour, day after day, walking about his room delivering speeches, now loud and angry, now soft and persuasive. Perfected by practice, Lord Randolph Churchill left for town, seized his opportunity, made a big speech and henceforth became a man to be reckoned with. Only to intimate friends did he ever refer to his rural training in parliamentary oratory, which has been of such splendid service to him.

Many depends upon the attitude in which we approach the consideration of such a question as this. Much depends on what we regard as the reasonable presumption and on whom we conceive that the burden of proof should rest.

When a prisoner is arraigned in court the presumption of law is that he is innocent until he is proven guilty, and the burden of proof is on those who accuse him. He does not, strictly speaking, need to prove his innocence at all, but simply to refute the charges against him. If he does this he must be set free. If he were accounted guilty till he had proven himself innocent, he might, though blameless, never be discharged.

Now I contend that the reasonable presumption is that a woman has a right to vote, and that till it is proven otherwise, the government has no right to withhold the suffrage from woman than the judge on the bench has to deny the accused his rights under the law.

The advocates of woman suffrage do not need in advance to prove that woman will use the ballot wisely, or even that she will use it at all, but simply to show that she has the same natural right to that man has. The judge may not foreknow that John Doe will use his freedom wisely. He may waste his time, he may squander his money, he may not improve his intellect, he may never worship his God; but the government has primarily to deal with none of these considerations. If not convicted of crime he is entitled to his liberty, and that speedily. If it be afterward found necessary to restrict his liberty, that may for good cause be done.

It has been said that woman has no natural right to vote. That is at best but a question of adjectives. She has no natural disability for voting, and that is enough. Suffrage is granted under a Republican form of government to a man because he is a man and because he has no natural disability. It should also be granted to woman because she also is a man, and she also has no natural disability. Every citizen of a Republic has a presumptive right to vote. If the good of the state requires that the ballot should be denied to any citizen, the one who affirms this must prove it. The citizen whose right is denied does not need to prove that the good of the state requires that he be permitted to vote. He has maintained his right if he has simply refuted the charges of his accuser.

Woman then has the right to vote because she has no disability, for sex is no disability. Neither physically, intellectually nor morally does it disable her from casting an intelligent and honest ballot. It is alleged that she is illiterate. No, for she is the most numerous teacher of embryo voters in our public schools. It is alleged that she is ignorant. She can, under our laws, read and be read, be fined, imprisoned, hanged. She is no more insane, and no more immoral, to say the least, than man. And she can so mark an Australian ballot that it shall express her sentiments, and can drop it into a box in as seemingly a way as can a man. Surely here are no disabilities which invalidate her presumptive right to vote.


