AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

A special meeting of the Agricultural Society was held on Friday afternoon, Jan. 29th inst., the president, Thomas Littleford, in the chair. The meeting was called to order at 2.30 p.m., when the following members were present: Messrs. Drinn, Harris, Foster, Hunt, Basington, Koster (W. L.), Jackson, Bink, Shield, Lottin, and Gray.

The meeting was addressed by the President, who explained that the object of the meeting was to hear correspondence read relative to the holding of a seed grain exhibition at Medicine Hat in February, next. The different correspondences were read and the matter was fully discussed, when it was moved by Messrs. Foster and Basington that the secretary be instructed to write the Alberta representative of the seed branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Calgary, and express the regrets of this society, that this being comparatively the first year of grain raising in the district and as a great deal of the best grain has already been sold, this meeting is of the opinion that a seed grain fair during the present season would be inexpedient; but that every preparation be made for ensuing seasons, and that this meeting request that the judges appointed be allowed to keep the date selected and meet growers, give an institute meeting and lecture on the business of grain growing.

Carried.
The matter of the C. P. R. selected seed grain and special train was then discussed, and it was moved by Messrs. Harris and McCutcheon that the Hon. W. T. Finlay be requested to wire the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Edmonton, and enquire why Medicine Hat has been omitted from the itinerary of the stopping places of the selected seed grain special. Carried.

A communication was then read to the meeting from the Inter-Western Pacific Exhibition Company, Calgary, respecting the holding of the Dominion Fair in the City of Calgary in 1907. After due discussion it was moved by the Hon. W. T. Finlay and seconded by R. McCutcheon, that this Agricultural Society place itself on record as being fully in accord with the Inter-Western Pacific Exhibition Company in this matter and will give it all the support possible, and

that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Hon. Frank Oliver, Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, and to Mr. Chas. W. Peterson, Secretary. Carried.
Moved by Messrs. Hunt and Blask that the meeting do now adjourn. Carried.
