Henry McCain is recovering from his illness and is able to be out again. Roland Fiske has sold his farm to Hedley Jewett and is going to the West.

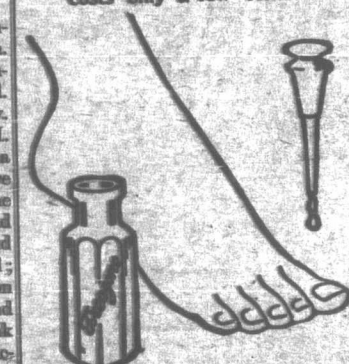
Bertie Gray took a trip to Woodstock on Monday last returning on Tuesday.
