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Parish Commissioner's Court.

The Oil Case.

As stated in the Post last week,

two barrels of kerosene from the

captioned schooner "Ella Maud"

were found on the premises of Gil-

bert Wheaton, Midgie, who was

arraigned at the instance of the

Collector of Customs before Com-

missioner Cahill and Justice D. G.

Dickson, for wrongfully detaining

wreck material. The prosecution

proved the finding of the oil on

Wheaton's premises and his admis-

sion that he had picked it up in the

river, and asked for the infliction

of the fine under the following sec-

tion of the law relating to wreck:

"Whenever a person takes possession

of wreck within the limits of Canada,

he shall be liable to pay to the owner

of the wreck, or to the collector of

customs, if the owner be unknown,

a fine of not more than \$50, and

in default of payment, the wreck

shall be sold to satisfy the fine."

The prosecution contended under

the sections that the finder of

wreck was obliged to deliver the

same without delay to the receiver,

and that the party holding wreck

does so at his peril—that the *onus*

is thrown upon him of proving the

lawfulness of his possession. The

learned justices held, however, that

the party in whose possession wreck

is found holds it lawfully, until the

receiver submits sufficient evi-

dence that it is held unlawfully.

An *onus* interest has attached to

this matter and as we apprehend

there has been a total miscarriage

of justice, we have secured from

the Justices a copy of their decision

for publication.

The case has been by complainant

against defendant for securing or conceal-

ing, or wrongfully having in his possession

wreck of the schooner "Ella Maud," which

was brought under Chap. 58, Victoria.
