THE BOERS WERE IN FORCE.

A Hard Fight in Which Canadians Were Engaged. One of the Bravest Charges of the War.

Race for Life and Liberty Against Tremendous Odds.

Robert Smith, a trooper of the South Africa Constabulary, writing to his sister, Miss Maggie Smith of Bond street, Toronto, tells of the engagement near Krugersdorp, in which young Slean was killed. He says: We had a hard fight on the last day of the old year, the hardest we have had since we came out here. There were only 31 of us, while the Boers had 400 men. We went out on a patrol in the forenoon, and had not got over two miles from home when they charged us. We dismounted and fired on them, not knowing how many there were of them. They came at us from all directions, and our captain told us to mount and retire, but they were all around us and fired on us when we mounted. They shot several of our horses and two men dead, and wounded six other men, but the rest of us charged them, firing while we ran. It was something to remember to see them coming and hear their bullets whistling past. Some of the horses stepped in holes and fell, but the rest of us passed right through between them. Then we had a race for life, firing at them until we got clear. They captured thirteen of our men all told, wounded and all, and stripped all the clothes off them and sent them to camp naked. The Captain, Sergeant Major and sergeant were captured, and counted twenty-one Boers dead and about forty wounded, so they got the worst of it. When we got to camp the ambulance went out to fetch in the wounded. The Boers said it was the hardest fight they had with so few men as we had. We buried the dead on New Year's Day, so it was not such a dappy New Year. One of them was a young man from Toronto, named Slean. He was a corporal. The Captain said he never saw a braver charge made all through the war than we made that day, right through their ranks. I came through without a scratch and was thankful.
