

MURDER OF PROF. YOUNG.

MURDER OF PROF. YOUNG. Many of our readers will remember Prof. Young, who taught singing classes here years ago, and whose children were so much enjoyed. The news has been received that the Prof. was cruelly murdered while attempting, with others to defend a wife from the murderous attacks of a jealous husband.

The particulars are as follows:—

Paris, Texas, May 19.—Samuel J. Holmes, a farmer, moved to Paris from Delta county about eighteen months ago, bringing his wife and children with him. Some months ago, for some unknown cause, the husband and wife separated. The wife continued to reside in their former dwelling and took a few boarders. Holmes is a man fifty years of age and of violent temper. He entered his wife's residence last night unannounced and immediately began a murderous attack upon her with a bowie knife. She was alone in the room when attacked, but defended herself as best she could, while screaming lustily for help.

Mrs. W. J. Tighe, and Professor J. W. Youngman, boarders of Mrs. Holmes, hastened to her assistance. As Professor Youngman entered the room Holmes sprang from the prostrate body of his wife and attacked him, stabbing him several times, killing him instantly. The murderer then turned upon the sister-in-law, Mrs. Tighe, and stabbed her in the chest and arms inflicting horrible wounds, from which she died this morning without recovering consciousness. The entire scene was witnessed by the unfortunate women around the neighbors, who hastened to their assistance but were appalled on entering the Holmes residence at the scene before them. Mrs. Holmes was found lying upon a bed bathed in blood. She was conscious, but crazed with fear and pain from the horrible wounds. Upon the floor lay Mrs. Tighe and the body of Youngman. The room presented the appearance of a slaughter pen.

Prof. Youngman was a music teacher and had been in Paris but a short time. The excitement over the diabolical crime is intense.

Paris, Texas, May 20.—Holmes, the triple murderer, after an exciting chase was overhauled and captured late last night in the densely wooded bottom of Red River, in Delta county, near his home. He made a desperate resistance, and when overpowered attempted to commit suicide by swallowing a large dose of morphine. A physician was promptly summoned, who by the prompt administration of a powerful emetic counteracted the effects of the deadly drug and saved the life of the murderer. Holmes was then securely manacled and brought here and jailed.

The excitement over the diabolical crime is yet intense, and tearing the excited populace might attempt to wreak summary vengeance upon the murderer, the jail building is strongly guarded.

The remains of two of Holmes' victims, Mrs. W. J. Tighe, his sister-in-law, and Professor J. W. Youngman, were interred yesterday, while Mrs. Holmes' death is hourly expected. Professor Youngman was a Canadian and had been engaged in teaching a class in music and elocution in this city, and was highly esteemed for his high social qualities.

GOOD WORDS FOR LIEUT.-COL. MORRIS.

The Winnipeg Times says:—

If there is one man more than another who deserves recognition for his services and deeds during the existence of the troubles in the North West Territories it is Lieut.-Col. Morris, who was in command of the men at Battleford, while it was surrounded by bands of marauding and plundering Indians. He was the right man for the position, and in the hour of need proved himself a good soldier and an excellent commanding officer. The Toronto Mail recently referring to Col. Morris, said:—

"Next let us speak of mention Col. Morris, the Inspector of Police, who was the commander in Battleford. He is a New Brunswicker, and an old volunteer officer, who has been but a year on the force. But his skill and courage, and watchfulness, and industrious attention to details have enabled him to maintain the most rigorous discipline of all the points in this affected territory.

This is high praise, but no more than the conduct of this brave officer merits. Services of the kind performed by Col. Morris would be handsomely rewarded in England, and it is to be hoped that the Dominion Government will not fail to recognize him for his gallant conduct in a manner much more substantial than mere praise for saving the lives of so many women and children. The critical situation in which Battleford stood for a long time is known to every one. That it passed through the siege successfully is due in a great measure to Col. Morris.

GOOD WORDS.

While one or two of the newspapers across the line have taken pleasure in our Canadian troubles in the Northwest, and have sought to make use of them to our discredit as a people, the larger and better portion of the American press has shown a forbearance and friendliness that contrasts favorably with the attitude of some of our own papers. Thus, the Detroit "Evening News" pays the Dominion the following compliment in connection with the overthrow of Riel:—

"It seems that the first serious reverse has knocked the bottom out of Riel's rebellion which at first promised to develop into formidable proportions. This result will not only attract settlers to the fertile region where the Dominion has thus manifested its power, but it will also, it is to be hoped, result in the army of any power might be proud. These raw boys, gathered from the shops and offices and farms of Quebec and Ontario, have traversed an insupportable distance, and have penetrated a country much more difficult than that which the British would have been compelled to cover between Falmouth and Henric. They have met and conquered an enemy too not so numerous indeed, but braver and better armed than the Afghans and Turcomans. It is a great feather in the cap of our neighbor and may indeed be called the 'Baptism of blood' of the young nation which is growing up on our border. For it is the first warfare of which the Dominion government has had supreme control. Canadians will hold their heads higher hereafter.

POUNDMAKER'S REASONS.

And now Poundmaker has given his reasons for being found with arms in his hands in rebellion against the government of Canada. Like White Cap, Beatty, and all the rest so far heard from, he was not aware that he had been "goaded" into rebellion by Sir John Macdonald's "criminal neglect" or by Governor Dewdney's "impoliteness." He had not even heard that there were such things. In his frank unvarnished way he told what it was that had led him to join in the uprising. He had been deceived by Riel, so he said, and if it were not for the lies that Riel had told him, he would have remained loyal and contented. He did not even mention one "wrong" that he thought ought to be righted, or complain of one "dishonest official" whose scalp should be taken. The young Indian

ENGLAND AND RUSSIA.

LONDON, May 29.—The Daily News

announces that the late authority that Russia's reply to England's counter proposals was received in London yesterday.

The reply, it says, involves the acceptance of the proposals and practically settles in a satisfactory manner the whole question of the Afghan boundary. Both Marchuk and Zulfiar remain in possession of the Amur. The main features of the work of delimitation have been finally fixed and the boundary commission will settle the details. The negotiations have been conducted in the most friendly spirit on both sides.

WHY RUSSIA ACCEPTED.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 30.—It is asserted in some quarters here that Russia's acceptance of the English proposals was due to the Czar's friendship for the British Cabinet and his desire to do nothing which would hazard a return of the Tory party in England to power. The concession of Marchuk and Zulfiar to Afghanistan, it was represented, would strengthen the Liberals who are regarded as more friendly to Russia. The Czar expects to visit the King of Denmark some time this summer.

The following is the exact state of the Afghan frontier negotiations: The Amur, surrenders Penjehk for Zulfiar; the question is unsettled whether Zulfiar Pass shall form part of the boundary or remain wholly in Afghanistan; Russia insists that Marchuk belongs to Penjehk; England objects and makes the retention of Marchuk the sine qua non. This difference is now the main difficulty.

HEAVY SEIZURE.—The Customs seizure of patent medicines recently made by the Canadian authorities is the largest in the aggregate that has been made during the past decade at least. It appears that the extensive drugstore of Messrs. J. C. Ayer & Co., of Lowell, Mass., sent on here and to other parts of Canada over \$80,000 worth of patent medicine, which was entered, according to the assessor's report, under the real value at the port of shipment in the United States. In Montreal and Toronto, \$40,000 worth of the same medicine was placed under the Government seal. The balance is distributed in St. John and Halifax, and in London and Hamilton, Ont. We understand that the seizure is only one in a long list of seizures in the past, and that Messrs. Ayer & Co. will be able to prove that there was no intention to defraud.—Globe.

GALE AT HALIFAX.—JUNE 1st.—An extremely heavy thunder and lightning storm, accompanied by a gale of wind and rain, from the southeast and south, has prevailed here since early this evening. It has been raining at intervals all day and from before dark until eleven o'clock. Flash upon flash of vivid lightning and peals of thunder followed each other continuously. The storm was the heaviest of the season, and shipping had to be landed securely to their moorings in the docks to prevent injury.
