Few looking over the assessment lists will agree that everyone is assessed on the correct amount | of his income. Personal property, especially, is very scarce, judging from the assessment sheet, although in actual fact there is not so great dearth of it in the houses of our townsfolk. The result is that those who report the amount of their personal belongings are taxed for the same while many who are worth much more but have not reported, are allowed to go scot free. While some young men claim that thoir income is rated too high, others accept their own rating as correct but feel that others with larger incomes are assessed on far sightly accepted. with largerincomes are assessed on far too small a sum.
