All honor to the noble, patrivite women who have brought this work to completion. I am sure that I voice the opinion of all who were associated with Mrs. J. S. Hendrie, the president, that she invites especial praise for her untiring zeal... "Victoria was a Queen as she owed allegiance to Him 'by whom Kings reign and princes decree justice.' She was a Queen, as she ruled in truth and right-cousness over her countless millions of loyal subjects. A Queen in her sympathy for the suffering and sorrowing; a Queen, as her brave heart went out to the brave soldiers and sallors as they fought the battles of the empire for the right; a Queen in uplifting and bettering her people. A Queen as she sat by the bedside of the sick and dying around her loved Balmoral, comforting them from the secret of Britain's greatness—the Bible.
