Going Up

One of the statements made by a witness before the Dominion Railway Commission on Wednesday caused Chairman Carvell to exclaim:

"If the railways want to charge the Canadian public \$100,000,000 in order to pay trainmen for working five hours a day, I should like to know something about it."

He said that he would require all the facts before he would grant the application for increased rates. This statement was drawn from Mr. Carvell by testimony indicating that some men were receiving \$5.56 for a five-hour day.

The chief witnesses said that costs of labor and materials were still on the upgrade and going fast. The railways and many other corporations continue to pile up their expenditures in every direction, and in some cases it appears to be shown that the advances are unavoidable. It all comes out of the public in the end, and the unorganized Canadians whose incomes are insufficient to meet the very gravely enhanced cost of existence are greatly troubled by the situation thus created. They have to rely upon the government and bodies like the Railway Commission to examine all the facts and to consider what must be the effect upon the great mass of Canadians to whom these rising costs are passed along from time to time. The proposed increased rates would add very greatly to the burden already carried by most Canadians, and the
