VIEWS OF STRIKING EMPLOYEES
Editor The Journal St. Catharines.
Dear Sir: Pursuant to the "advised policy" of the Beaver Wood Fibre Company and on behalf of the striking employees, members of the International Brotherhood of Papermakers, I desire to reply to some of the statements made by the above-mentioned Company, under date of June 19th. I would thank you to publish same in order that the position of the striking employees might be placed in its true light. Space will not permit me to reply in detail, however, I therefore, will try to be as explicit as possible.
As a matter of explanation it is my desire to take up the matter of Mr. E. C. Robinson's statement regarding "a Mr. Nellegar" who stated he was an organizer. To this I wish to say that Mr. Nellegar is not only an organizer for the International Brotherhood of Papermakers but is also General Organizer for the American Federation of Labor. It is true that Mr. Nellegar called upon Mr. Robinson at the Buffalo office of the Beaver Company and presented demands and memorandum of agreement and it is also true that Mr. Robinson stated the position of his Company and the arbitrary position the employees had taken. Mr. Robinson further explains that Mr. Nellegar called him on the phone at ten minutes after eleven on the morning of June 17th. I desire to say that this is also true but as a matter of fact Mr. Nellegar endeavored to communicate with Mr. Robinson as early as nine o'clock of the same morning but was unable to do so, due to the fact that Mr. Robinson was absent from the Buffalo office.
On the morning above mentioned Mr. Robinson was at the mill in Thorold where he had gone for the purpose of meeting with the members of the Union.
I desire to say further, that as early as Friday morning June 13th, Mr. Nellegar was in communication with the Buffalo office of the Beaver Company and endeavored to communicate with Mr. McGlashan or any other accredited representative, receiving the advice that Mr. McGlashan was absent in Europe and that the authority to appraise was Mr. Robinson. This information was given by a Mr. Davis who advised that Mr. Robinson was absent from the city and would not return until Saturday or Monday. The nature of Mr. Nellegar's business was communicated to Mr. Davis who I have reason to believe communicated with some representative of the Company, for the reason that on the same afternoon, Friday, a notice was posted in the mill at Thorold to the effect that the grinder room help would go on the eight hour basis on Monday morning, June 16th. In my opinion that is considerably more time given the company than the fifty minutes mentioned in the article which appeared in The Standard.
For past four weeks work of organizing has been going on among the employees of the mill at Thorold and it is safe to say that the Company was well aware of the intention of their employees.
It has been stated that the demands of the employees are arbitrary and that the grievances are imaginary. Let me ask if when men are compelled to work eleven and thirteen hours they have not grievance enough and especially when they are competing against their fellow workers in other localities who are compelled to work eight hours only. Let me ask again, if a demand should not be made for good lavatories and sanitation, and further, if unfiltered water pumped from the canal is not grievance

enough, to say nothing of the long hours of idleness.
It has been stated that for economical reasons the eight-hour workday would be granted on July 1st and to this I desire to say that the only reason, it seems to us, for the Company granting the eight hours at any time is to forestall the organization of its employees. In order to prove this let me quote Mr. Robinson "As early as last year, Mr. Nellegar, the directors of the Company, decided that they would adopt the eight hour workday for economical reason." Now if this is true, why was it that the directors waited so long before putting into execution their plan of economy? I suppose the war had something to do with it?
To again quote Mr. Robinson "I or no other representative of the Company, have any authority to enter into the matter of either grievances or agreement with your Union in the absence of Mr. McGlashan."
Now if there is no authority in the absence of Mr. McGlashan, let me ask who had the authority to reduce the hours of the mechanics from a ten hour workday to nine, with ten hours pay?
Again, who had the authority for placing the employees of the grinder room on the eight hour basis on Monday morning?
It would seem from the above that there is some irresponsibility on the part of the Company or its management, for if this were not true, a corporation as large as the Beaver Wood Fibre Company would leave some one in authority who would be responsible for the acts of the Company.
It is quite usual for manufacturing interests to refer to labor representatives as being agitators, so that we are not surprised to hear the statement coming from the representatives of the Beaver Company. However, we do not misrepresent, we have no reason to.
I would agree with that paragraph regarding the "Beaver Board" having "a good set of men" and I know they want to do what is right; not only with regard to the Company but for their own interests and have for this reason organized. It would seem, judging from the opinion of Mr. Robinson that were it not for the fact of Mr. Nellegar visiting Thorold the employees of the Company would not have organized. To this I desire to say that the Company did more to organize their employees than possibly Mr. Nellegar could have done. As a matter of fact we were contemplating organization considerably longer than three months. However, Mr. Nellegar has held but four meetings with us and has upon every occasion advised not only for the betterment of the employees but also in the interest of the employer. Our strike was the result of due deliberation and without any agitation.
In conclusion I desire to say that the pertinent publication and self-explanatory policy of the Company is in the opinion of the employees for no other purpose than to intimidate their employees from organizing and continuing the strike.

GIRLS FROM MUNITION FACTORIES ARE GOING ON FARMS.
The English girls who have toiled so hard making munitions to back the boys have not only given their time and other work, but many of them have given their most precious possession—health.
An interesting and successful experiment has been made in transferring groups of girls from munition factories to work on the land. The doctors had recommended that these women should get into the open air, where they would have a chance of recovering their original vitality.
The women's branch of the food production department has given the care of these girls special attention.
So successful has the experiment been, the welfare workers of these respective branches of women's labor are establishing centres on the same lines so that the good work of restoring munition girls to health may be continued.

A FEW OF THE POINTS IN THE PEACE TREATY
The Central Powers must accept the Covenant of the League of Nations and the Labor Charter.
They must renounce all their extra-European rights.
They must demobilize all their naval and aerial forces.
They must recognize the complete independence of Hungary.
Enemy nationals guilty of violating international laws of war to be tried by the allies.
Must accept economic conditions and freedom of transit.
Must recognize the independence of Czechoslovakia and Jugoslavia.
Austria is recognized as an independent republic under the name "Republic of Austria."
Must recognize full independence of all territories formerly a part of Russia.
Brest-Litovsk treaty is annulled.
All treaties with Russian elements concluded since the revolution are annulled.
Allies reserve right of restitution for Russia from Austria.
Central Powers must consent to abrogation of treaties of 1889, establishing Belgian neutrality.
Central Powers must agree to new Belgian boundaries as fixed by the Allies.
Similar provisions with respect to neutrality and boundaries of Luxembourg.
Central Powers must accept Allies' dispositions of any Austrian rights in Turkey and Bulgaria.
Austria must accept allied arrangements with Germany regarding Schleswig-Holstein.
Central Powers' navies to be surrendered to the Allies.
All warships, including submarines, under construction, shall be broken up and may only be used for industrial purposes.
All naval arms and materials must be surrendered.
Future use of submarines prohibited. Military clauses are reserved.
New states required to aid in prosecution and punishment of their nationals guilty of offences against international law.
Central Powers may send no naval, military, or aerial mission to any foreign country.
Wireless stations not to be used for military or political messages without Allied consent for three months.
Aircraft no military or naval air forces.
