

DEMONSTRATIONS ARE ANTI-CLERICAL

Radicals in France and Italy Institute Vigorous Campaign Against Church.

SPANISH ARMY IS LOYAL TO THE CROWN
Madrid, Oct. 18.—The army remains loyal, they holding King Alfonso upon the throne while the radicals incited by Professor Ferrer's execution are doing their utmost to cause defection in their ranks.

Paris, Oct. 17.—The first attempt at a demonstration here, conducted in London, with the police as assistants rather than as enemies, took place today and was a distinct success. Forty thousand manifestants paraded at a slow rate along the pre-arranged route.

Dispersed Without Disorder.
When the Place de la Concorde was reached, the leaders strove to persuade everybody to disperse without disturbance. The procession, which included many women and children, relieved its feelings by singing the "Internationale" and crying "La Cañale, Hon Hour!" and "Vive le Roi."

Formed a Body Guard.
"Comrades, he is all alone and is an old man," he said. "He is not a man, he is a child." The crowd shouted the word "Lepine" and the man with the red beard and thousands of others formed themselves into a bodyguard and made a lane through the mass of people for Lepine to stroll out.

Anti-Clasical Campaign in Italy.
Rome, Oct. 18.—All indications point to the fact that extremists in Italy are determined to undertake an anti-clerical campaign, more vigorous even than in France.

Attack on Barcelona Prison.
Lisbon, October 17.—Cable dispatches from Barcelona say that the situation there is increasingly disquieting. Twenty-seven bombs have been thrown in the last four days, five persons being killed and twenty-one wounded.
