What About Those Market Prices?

Some time ago it was announced that the Government, through the Minister of Fisheries, would supply the public with the price of fish in the foreign markets. The information supplied so far has been so meagre as to be little more than valueless. Those planters on the Labrador who have intimated that they will not sell their fish at less than \$4.20 contend that the state of the foreign market warrants the increase. On the other hand the local fish buyers contend that the prospects abroad do not warrant \$4.20, and they hold to \$3.50. A regular local publication of the prices and their fluctuations at the different selling centres abroad would enable the fishermen to see for themselves what is due to them for their fish, whether there is an increasing demand in the several foreign markets and whether prices are rising or sinking.

We understand the Government some time ago undertook to do this, but up to to-day they have signally failed to keep their promise. What has been done only makes the failure more glaring.

Charged With Destroying Relative's Barn.

Yesterday Head Const. Dave was sent down to Outer Cove to investigate a case of alleged incendiarism and arrested and brought to the city last night a man named Patrick Nugent of that place on a charge of setting fire to and destroying a barn owned by his father-in-law, Patrick Brien. The act was committed on Saturday night last, and the barn, which was filled with newly cut hay, farming implements, &c., was completely destroyed. The loss to the owner is said to be in the neighborhood of \$1,000. It is also alleged that the prisoner was heard to utter threats against Brien. When arraigned in the police court to-day the prisoner pleaded not guilty and was remanded for 3 days, pending further enquiry.

Concluded Investigation

Sergt. Byrne returned last night from the Trepassey branch railway where he had been conducting an investigation into the reporting of spikes between the joints in the neighborhood between Bay Bulls and Witless Bay. The sergeant is satisfied that this was done by thoughtless boys, who did not realize what could happen as a result of what they did. They were not discovered, but the sergeant warned the parents of boys along the line that a repetition of such conduct on the part of their sons will entail the severest penalties, and he thinks that there will not be a recurrence.

BERLIN, Noon.
The Foreign Secretary declares that the danger of war between France and Germany over the Morocco question has passed. He hopes to be able to announce the terms of the settlement in the Reichstag on October 10th. It is understood that the political status of France in Morocco has been settled. It is clear that Germany consents to the French protectorate over Morocco in return for a treaty which will strictly define her economic rights in that country, and in addition a slice of the Congo.

Exposed to Fourteen Hours' Rainstorm

CHANNEL, This afternoon.
A picnic party, mostly ladies, went out by express yesterday morning to Red Rock. Incoming train from St. John's had orders to stop and pick them up, but owing to some unexplained cause neglected doing so. When headquarters, St. John's, were notified, agent at Port aux Basques was instructed to send out flat car attached to engine for the purpose of bringing picnicers home. This entire method of conveyance was indignantly refused, and rightly so? Does the R. N. Co. imagine that they are dealing with savages? Their action has aroused a strong feeling of resentment against whoever is responsible for the outrage, and close enquiry into the cause of express's failure to stop at Red Rocks should be instituted. After stormy negotiations on the part of those interested, the railway company at length condescended to send out a second class passenger car to bring in the party, which arrived at 11 a.m., having spent fourteen hours exposed to a violent rain storm.

Banker Loses Man.

This morning the banker Arwance, Capt. Cook, arrived here at half past five for the loss of one of her crew. The vessel had been two weeks on the Banks, had fish fairly plentiful and has to date 1,800 qtls. for 7 dories. The vessel had very stormy weather the past week, lost her anchor and 45 fathoms of cable with a complete set of trawls and some other gear. The captain decided to run in here and get some bait, and in doing so a sad accident occurred at 7 this morning when the vessel was 10 miles S. E. of Cape Spear, one of the crew, Daniel Riser, was sent with others to get up a storm sail and was holding on to the thwart block while a high sea ran, when the vessel took a sudden pitch, he was swung out overboard and went into the trough of the sea. All the crew were on deck, and he was hardly gone overboard when a dory with 3 men on board were in the water and were pulling for him with might and main. The vessel was running before the wind at a nine mile clip and the man was left far in the ship's wake in a few minutes. He could not swim, was heavily clad and when the dory reached within 80 yards of him he sank. He was aged 29, single, of Rose Bay, Lunenburg County, and a mother, father, sister and a brother survive him. Capt. Cook telegraphed the clergyman of the place this afternoon to break the sad news to his relatives.

Police Court News.

To-day a man who was drunk and disorderly in Mr. H. W. LeMessurier's office at the Customs building, and whom Mr. LeMessurier had to put out, was before the court. He was sent down for 3 months. A number of toughs of late have been tormenting Mr. LeMessurier, preventing the transaction of business in his office, and he has had to use force to eject them. He set forth these facts to-day in court and those who have been so acting should take warning or they will meet the fate of the party alluded to above.
