Mrs. Tucker Welcomes the Governor.

SHE HAS HER IDEAS ON THE 21 GUNS.

Well, says Mrs. Tucker, I see our Governor, Sir Ralph Williams, is back again safe and sound. There's a kind of loneliness about the town when the Governor is away, and to see him drive around again makes us feel a kind of secure. Some times, says she, I imagine Governors are unnecessary, that we could get on first rate without them; but after the Governor is away for any length of time a loneliness creeps around the city and you feel a kind of uneasy. "Tis something like going to sea without the captain, there's a want that must be filled, and can only be filled by the man himself.

Mrs. Tucker welcomes back His Excellency and Lady, and also his wife. Mrs. Tucker doesn't quite understand what the "suite" is, but any way she welcomes it back, for it must be something worth welcoming when 'tis in company with the Governor. Mrs. Tucker thinks 'tis about time that they cut out firing twenty-one guns when the Governor arrives. There's nothing of the genuine, spontaneous character about it—nothing wholesaled or original. I'll bet twenty dollars, says Mrs. Tucker, that if you were in chums with the Governor and could talk to him in a straightforward fashion, and if you asked him what he thought of this twenty-one gun business, he'd tell you 'twas one of the numerous ordeals you have to undergo when you are a Governor. Another, is being accounted on the landing by a fleet of insincere well wishers, who tell him a dozen times that they are delighted to meet him once again, and shake his hand in an official, gingerly manner. You see the same old "second eleven" team on the wharf in all weathers and at all hours, and if the Governor cut out the twenty-one gun business it would afford him a grand opportunity of reaching home without being bored to death.

One of our Governors, who by the way died early, being asked if he dreaded the passage out to Newfoundland in the winter, said he didn't mind the passage at all. What did disturb him most was meeting the same old crowd on the wharf when he arrived. You can arrive in the dead of night, says he, when grave yards admit goats, and as soon as the report of guns resound o'er south side hills, through the gate will swarm the same old-fashioned faces that drove Governors in days gone by the untimely deaths, either that or drove them to the Bahamas or a warmer climate.

Grand Falls Robbery.

Inspector General Sullivan had word yesterday afternoon to the effect that another robbery had been committed at Grand Falls Sunday night last. One of the large plate glass windows in F. B. Woods store and restaurant there, managed by H. Hayward, was found to have been broken by stones which had been thrown by some person outside. The manager investigated but could not find that anything had been stolen, but a few hours later 6 large dishes which contained cake, etc., were found about 400 yards distant from the store in the woods with particles of the cake about. This had been stolen from the store Sunday night by the party who broke the glass. The plate glass is worth considerable money and the cakes which were stolen were also valuable. Constable Martin is engaged on the case but has little or no clue to work on.
