King George V. Institute.

OPENED BY DEPUTY GOVERNOR.

Yesterday a large and representative gathering took their places in the fine auditorium of the Seamen's Institute for the formal opening. Mr. Withers was in the chair, and on the platform with him were the Deputy Governor, Sir William H. Horwood, Lady Horwood, Mr. Archibald, the Chairman of the R.N.M.D.S.F., Dr. Van Dyke, the Chairman of the American Committee; Mr. J. A. Macdonald, a representative of the Y.M.C.A. of Canada; His Honor Mayor Ellis, Canon White and Mr. J. Browning, Mr. Gosling and others.

The proceedings opened with the singing of "O God our help in ages past," after which the Chairman made a few introductory remarks commending the success of the effort which had resulted in the erection of

the great building with its magnificent fittings, and the zeal of Dr. Grenfell which had made the undertaking possible.

The Deputy Governor delivered a fine speech in the course of which he called upon Mr. Archibald, the Chairman of the Deep Sea Mission, to read a message he had received from His Majesty the King. During the reading of it the audience stood and afterwards sang the National Anthem. Sir William then proceeded with his speech and formally declared the Institute open.

Mr. Archibald prefaced his speech by reading messages from President Taft, Queen Alexandra and from several fleets of fishermen around the coast of Great Britain. He spoke of the difficulties experienced by zealous missionaries on the Labrador and in the north previous to the advent of Dr. Grenfell, and the advantages which had been derived by the supplementary surgical, medical, social and religious aids which Dr. Grenfell had brought to bear on them. The personal magnetism of Dr. Grenfell had enlisted the services of many men and women to take up these services. The building itself was a monument of the desire of the English speaking world to help their fellows.

The Premier, Sir Edward Morris, paid a tribute to the work of Dr. Grenfell, and said that the success of the Institute would depend largely on

its management. If kept clean and attractive and free from the taint of charity, he had anticipated its success would be great.

Dr. Van Dyke said Dr. Grenfell's greatest achievement was not what he had done on the Labrador but in Canada, the States and England, where he had brought out the sympathetic feeling of man to man, and pointed out opportunities for social service. He hoped all the Patron Saints of the city would bless the Institute. That St. George would fight the dragon of evil, St. Andrew spur brother to help brother, St. Patrick scotch the snake of intemperance, St. John the Baptist inspire men with courage and boldness, and St. John the Divine teach men to love.

Mr. J. A. Macdonald gave his experience of Y. M. C. A.'s, and showed how necessary it was to avoid airs of patronage and taints of charity. He thought success depended largely on allowing men to work out their own social salvation on good lines.

His Honor Mayor Ellis considered the building was a monument to the skill of the artisans of the city.

In proposing a vote of thanks to donors and helpers, Dr. Grenfell said he considered a man who gave of his substance was benefitting himself more than others by bringing out the best that was in him. The largest donor of all was the firm of Bowring Brothers, and indeed many of the larger donations had come from the city. Among outside donors Dr. Van Dyke was one of the largest givers. He would be away himself mostly and he now put it up to the local committee to carry on the Institute successfully. There would be many difficulties to face, but he believed the committee had now a building sufficiently commodious and attractive to make the movement a success. Mr. Fearn seconded the motion. The prayer for God's blessing on the work was offered by Canon White.

Messages and letters conveying congratulations and good wishes, were read from His Majesty King George, the Queen Mother, President Taft, Colonel Roosevelt, the fishermen of Milford Haven, the Newlyn Bible Class, the fishermen of Grimsby, the fishermen of the Dogger Bank, the fishermen of the great Northern Fleet, the Hospital steamer "Queen Alexandra" and others. FROM HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE V.

LONDON, July 13.
I congratulate Newfoundland and Labrador, and the Royal National Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen, upon possessing, through the untiring efforts of Dr. Grenfell, such a fine institute for seamen and fishermen at St. John's, and I hope it may prove a great blessing, temporally and spiritually, to those engaged in the fishing industry in whose welfare I take a warm interest. I rejoice that the occasion has been the means of evoking the generosity of the branches of the Anglo-Saxon race on both sides of the Atlantic, and has helped to accentuate the very happy fraternal relations existing between them.
