#### Magisterial Enquiry.

The enquiry into the cause of the fire which destroyed the Reid Company's machine shops was continued yesterday when three witnesses were

Michael Dunn, Supt. of the Fire Deence stated that the fire alarm was dence stated that the fire alarm was rung in at 7.33 a.m. on the 13th inst. from Box 41. I proceeded to the fire on the chemical engine, arriving three or four or five minutes afterwards. The firemen from the West End Station were then on the scene. They had a hose connected at the corner of Brazil's Lain. There was neither stream of water on the burning building when I got there. I went down to ing when I got there. I went down to eastern end of building where fire was raging furiously. There being no water I came back to find out delay when I saw the water coming from the hese which was laid out by the Western Station men. Central men coup-led up two streams at Job Street Two streams were also put on from the steam engine. The fire had made such progress when I arrived that I considered that owing to the insufficient supply of water we had to confine our efforts to the eastern portion of the building. Know nothing of any explosion beyond what I heard. If there was one it must have happened before I arrived. Water Inspector Donnelly informed me there was no water in the East End of the city.
