## The Officious Official.

By RUTH CAMERON.



"All public institutions, I here assert, should have as their employees only people who are courteous, pleasant and kind. One of the greatest hardships of poverty is to be obliged to face the autocratic martinet who seems to guard the doorways of all such organizations. There is something detestable and offensive in the frozen, impatient and often insulting manner of the men and women who occupy little positions of authority like these, and before who poor working girls, and I suppose, men, must go."

The above is an extract from the life story of a girl who left her home with only ten dollars in her pocket and with little education, and who, after many vicissitudes, became a successful author.

Turned Into The Streets.

In the course of her adventures she went to Chicago without any knowledge of the city, and having been told of one of the homes for girls, tried to get a room there. She had money to pay for it, but was at first refused, because she had no written character and knew no one in the city from whom she could get one. Eventually she was admitted, but only after an unpleasant controversy with an official, such as she described. Afterwards she saw other girls turned away for lack of money or credentials.

The story is supposed to be perfectly true.

I can well believe that her experience with the disagreeable official is

solid autobiography. I have long had it in my mind to write something along this line and have hesitated for fear my own experience might be unusual and hence unfair to tell about. But it is evident that others have had similar experiences.

One of My Own Experiences. I remember a woman in charge of an exchange where women's products are sold. I went there one day to buy. My order was not large, but I meant to go again if I were refused. When she heard my small order this woman treated me so slightly, so impatiently that I never cared to go again.

This is one of several experiences. I hope I am not actuated by a grudge. There is nothing, to my mind, smaller than to let a sense of personal injury prejudice one against a worthy cause and I do not mean to write in that spirit.

The Gentlewoman Who Needs a Job.

But I do think the people who conduct such philanthropies need warning. Altogether too often the existence of such positions is used as an opportunity to find a comfortable berth for the protégé of some wealthy patron. These are often gentlemen in reduced circumstances who are not trained for any other occupation. Oftentimes such women are hopelessly out of sympathy with the class they are supposed to serve. They feel themselves creatures of another world and they patronize, irritate and antagonize those whom they are paid to help.

It seems to me that people in such positions should be carefully watched and either taught sympathy and real helpfulness or asked to find employment where they cannot do much harm. I believe some system should be followed like that whereby the telephone company makes sure of the

## THE ISSUE.

The issue between America and Germany is the issue between law and lawlessness. That would be the case even though the law which we have undertaken to vindicate were simply the established law of nations—simply the embodiment of unchallenged rights of American citizens—even although that law rested on no principle that carried with it far-reaching and profound consequences. To assert the supremacy of law when flagrantly and arrogantly defied would itself be a national duty of the highest order. But when it is realized how vital is the thing actually at stake, and how profound is the issue between the respective nations, the duty is seen to have a character of particular solemnity—just that solemnity which marked both of the notes addressed to Germany on the destruction of the Lusitania.
