Methodist
Missions

Delegates Tell of Work Accomplished
and Plans for Coming Year.

By the express Wednesday, Mr.
Arthur Mews, C.M.G., returned from
Canada, where he had gone on busi-
ness connected with the Methodist
Church. Mr. Mews looked in at the
General Conference, meeting in Ham-
ilton, and spent a few days visiting
relatives in Buffalo, that city being
then in the grip of the "flu," and hav-
ing the added experience of a street
with other and a Liberty Loan cam-
paign. At Toronto were held the ses-
sions of the General Board of Mis-
sions, Rev. Dr. Saint and Mr. Mews
being the representatives from New-
foundland, with Rev. Dr. Fenwick at-
tending as Superintendent of Missions.
The Board consists of about sixty
representatives, from Newfoundland
in the East, stretching across Canada
to British Columbia in the West.
Appropriations, amounting to 1,000,000
(one million dollars), were consider-
ed and passed in respect of the work
on the Home and Foreign Mission
Fields. The amount of money is ab-
solutely essential—it does not provide
for any additional missionaries or new
developments, but simply makes pro-
vision for the maintenance of the
work in hand. Last year the sum
amounted to almost \$800,000, of which
Newfoundland contributed \$24,000.
This year the standard has been set at
\$1,000,000, Newfoundland's share be-
ing \$30,000. Rev. C. E. Manning, M.
A., is the General Secretary of Home
Missions, in the place of the late Rev.
James Allen, M.A., and Rev. Lloyd
Smith, M.A., B.D., was elected Field
Secretary in the room of Mr. Manning.
Rev. Dr. Endicott continues as Gen-
eral Secretary of the Foreign work. The
sessions of the Board were most in-
spiring. Bishop Haraiwa, of the
Japanese Methodist Church, was pres-
ent, and his counsels of advice were
of the greatest value to the Foreign
Committee. Revs. McKenzie, Stewart,
Service and other missionaries from
China, attended the sessions, and they
all wished to be remembered to Rev.
Dr. Bond, pastor of Cochrane Street
Centennial Church, who visited them
in China some years ago. In connec-
tion with other Churches, the Methodist
Church is getting ready to embark on
a programme of missionary endeavour
that will eclipse all former efforts—a
programme which is necessary if the
Church is to take her place and do her
part in making democracy safe for
the world. To celebrate the centen-
nial of missions in 1924, it is proposed
to raise \$5,000,000, and arrangements
for this will be made in a year's time,
when the programme will be definitely
launched.

Arrangements for the meeting of
the Supernumerary Committee at St.
John, or at Sackville, fell through
because of the "flu" and the board of
health regulations. Eventually it was
fixed for Saturday, 2nd Nov., at Am-
herst. Twelve months ago this Com-
mittee had commenced negotiations
looking to an amalgamation of the two
pension schemes of the Church. The
negotiations had been successful, and
the General Conference in October
confirmed the work and gave the am-
algamation legal form. Under this, all
ministerial claimants in Newfound-
land will receive 50 per cent. increase
in their allowances, and ministers'
widows will receive 100 per cent. in-
crease. This is to come into effect at
once, and the Supernumerary Com-
mittee had to take up the matter and
make the necessary arrangements.
The General Conference ordered the
raising of a capital sum of \$1,500,000
for this Pension Fund, but until this
amount is raised, it is proposed that
ministers and circuits shall contribute
sufficiently to the current income to
enable the increased payments to be
made. This amalgamation and in-
creased provision for the retired min-
isters is hailed with great satisfaction
by the whole Church. The Adminis-
tration of the Eastern section for this
year will remain in the hands of the
present Committee, and remittances
are to be sent to Dr. J. H. Calmer,
Sackville, as usual.

Too Much Fuss
Over Germany.

The Boston "Shoe and Leather Re-
porter" says: "Entirely too much is
being said and written about condi-
tions in Germany after the war. The
situation is not our problem except as we must
defend ourselves from the frenzied
efforts Germany will make to recon-
struct her industries through the
purchase of raw materials. In our
own trade we are well aware that
not less than three millions of cat-
tle hides would be needed to fill the
empty vats and restore the German
tanning industry. The new and en-
ormous demand for hides coming up-
on an already depleted market might
develop panic conditions. It would
seem plausible that in other trades
as well as ours the period immedi-
ately following the war will be sur-
rounded with dangers and difficulties
which can only be survived through
inter-allied control. We must con-
sider the rehabilitation of ourselves
and our Allies. If our enemies were
to win the war our interests would
not receive consideration, hence it is
difficult to understand why apprehen-
sion of their fate should take prece-
dence of sensible plans for our own
recuperation. Indeed it should be
evident to all that the Teutonic men-
ace to the peace of the world will not
be removed until the inextinguishable
logic of events has demonstrated to the
German mind that the State policy
which led up to the war has induced
poverty instead of prosperity, com-
mercial isolation instead of world
domination. The great conflict will
have been in vain if Germany is per-
mitted to escape the natural conse-
quences of her acts."
