"I notice had his car stolen the other day and broken up. I had the same thing done to me last summer. though fortunately no damage was done to my car. I then discovered, however, that there was no practical way-of punishing the parties as the law now stands. The position is as follows:—(1) You can sue the thieves for civil damages for trespass to your property, but that is no good as they never have any money; (2) You might prosecute the thieves for malicious age to property, if they did any and you could prove it, but that is a small matter with a maximum fine of twenty-five dollars; (3) They might be ecuted for driving without ase, if they had not one, but that is a very small matter; (4) You cannot indict them for larceny because it is not larceny, unless they intento keep the car, which they do not.
