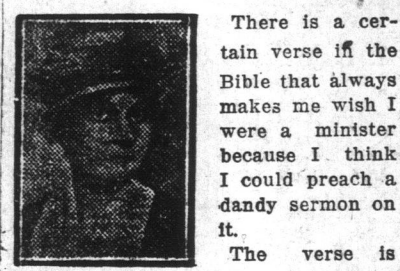

But I like the idea that some day we shall so develop that we shall be able to breathe that purer air.

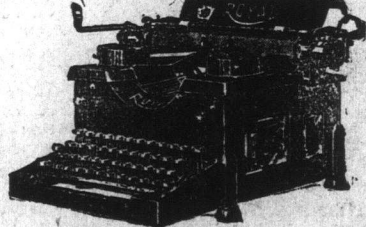
### A Heaven Worth While.

### Household Notes.

To get the true flavor of raspberries, sprinkle with sifted sugar and stand in sun for an hour, covered with light muslin to keep flies away.

Shrimp and cucumber make an excellent combination for a summer salad. Run the shrimp through the food chopper and garnish with water-cress.

When putting up lunches or picnic meals, use the small receptacles which have no cover of their own by pouring melted paraffin over top after filling. Before heating apples for cooking, pour scalding water over them and allow them to stand for several minutes. The peeling will come off as thin as paper.

A deliciously cool drink for a hot summer day is made by pouring one pint hot tea over cracked ice, and adding one pint bottle ginger ale. Serve with sugared lemon slices.

If you are having an ice or fruit punch as part of a menu of a formal dinner, serve it between the meat and game courses. If game is not served, omit the ice.

A very delicious dessert is made by using ordinary unfrosted layer cake. Split the cake, spread on lower half of the favorite ice cream, and then replace the upper half, and serve with hot chocolate or fruit sauce.

## Municipal Council

The regular weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and Councilors Outerbridge, Vinnicombe, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed, and the regular business of the meeting disposed of, after which the following matters were dealt with.

The Deputy Colonial Secretary forwarded a copy of reports from the Council of the Board of Trade and their sub-committee, in reference to the supply of light and power for the city of St. John's from the standpoint of the consumer, together with a report on the Electric Plant. The matter was discussed at last meeting, and is deferred for further consideration.

A petition signed by a number of City Sportmen, asking that the License Fees for sporting dogs be the same as last season, was tabled. The Council has already fixed the Fees to be paid this year, and are therefore unable to accede to the request of the petitioners.

D. Smith applied for position in connection with the Sanitary Staff. There is no vacancy.

M. W. Myrick drew attention to the necessity of having a gully placed at the corner of Knight Street and Military Road. The Engineer will enquire into same.

Complaint was received that the land in the vicinity of Newtown Road is being used for dumping purposes. During the past few days this was discontinued.

R. Sutton's offer of land for the deposition of garbage was referred to the Sanitary Supervisor.

The Dominion Vulcanizing Company's application for permission to install gasoline tank at their station, Adelaide Street, was referred to the Inspector General.

Dr. J. S. Tait complained of old

unused sewer near his dwelling, Patrick Street, and asked that it be closed up. He also referred to the irregular and uneven condition of sidewalk, Plank Road. Both these matters were referred to the City Engineer.

During the past week a visit was made to Long Pond, and it was decided to open up a Swimming Pool at this place. The services of an expert instructor and caretaker have been secured.

Contract for the supplying of uniforms for the Inspectors was awarded W. P. Shortall.

In connection with the renaming of the new streets in that portion of the city, between Newtown Road and the old railway track, the following changes were made:—

The reports of the City Health Officer, City Engineer, etc., for the week were read.

Accounts presented were ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.
