Swedish Salesmen For South America.

STOCKHOLM.—A new Viking vessel from Sweden, manned with expert salesmen armed with literature on up-to-date railroad engines, will sail shortly for South America. This unique way of finding new markets for their products has been devised by

Swedish locomotive builders, who have just delivered the two hundredth locomotive on an order from the Russian Soviet. A fine steam yacht of 500 tons has been purchased in Spain, and will be fitted out for the expedition. A commander of the Swedish Navy has been secured to serve as skipper, and his crew will include several of the men who have just completed a round-the-world cruise on a sailing yacht. The president of the company, together with several of his technical experts, will direct the work of the expedition. It is expected that most of the South American republics will be visited. Swedish locomotives have formed a big item of Sweden's exports to Russia, and shipments are continuing, though the number originally ordered by the Soviet has been reduced.

World's Heavyweight Wrestling Championship

LEWIS RETAINS HIS TITLE.

St. Louis, Dec. 15.—Ed. (Strangler) Lewis to-day retained his title of world's heavyweight wrestling champion after a grueling three fall match last night with Stanislaus Zbyszko, from whom he won the championship a year ago at Wichita, Kansas. Outweighed and with the additional handicap of 12 years in age, the Polish veteran brought all his craft into play in the second attempt to regain the title, taking the first fall with a flying mare when he threw the champion over his head and smashed him against the floor.

Lewis' crushing headlock won the second fall, however, after a series of toe holds weakened his 43 year old opponent.

In the struggle for the fall Zbyszko's right shoulder was dislocated and it was with an arm-lock around the injured shoulder that Lewis won the third fall and match. Zbyszko gamely went on for the deciding fall after his shoulder had been snapped back into place and fought his way out of dangerous holds repeatedly after his seconds were about to toss in a towel in token of defeat.

The men wrestled before the largest crowd that ever saw a mat contest here, approximately 12,000 persons. Receipts were approximately \$16,000. Lewis received \$7,500 and Zbyszko \$4,500.

Brigadier-General. CONDUCTS A RESTAURANT.

LONDON.—(Canadian Press)—Behind a desk during business hours in an unpretentious but spotlessly clean restaurant in Marlborough Court, Carnaby Street, London, stands the proprietor, no less a personage than Brigadier-General W. B. Hulke, D.S.O., one of the heroes of the Great War. The restaurant was recently opened by the General. It is appropriately named "The Venture," and so far it

is not known whether it may prove a profitable one or not. It's proprietor, however, seems to have faith in it, and this is a big part of the battle. When the war began, Brigadier-General Hulke was a retired officer, farming in British Columbia. He left everything in Canada and went to France, where he had a brigade in the 38th Division. He was wounded in the knee, and, in fact, only recently ceased to be under medical treatment. "My property, which deteriorated during the war, is over in Canada, waiting to be sold," General Hulke told an interviewer here recently. "I cannot climb and jump now, because of my knee, and like tens of thousands of others, I cast around to look for a means of livelihood. My wife is assisted by Mrs. Wallis, the wife of a Colonel; my chef is an ex-soldier and, perhaps, our circumstances have impressed us with the need of a place where people of refinement may obtain lunch, tea or supper, served on linen skin to their home life, at reasonable prices." Simply decorated, "The Venture," with tables covered with snowy white table cloths, with serviettes, serves a really well cooked and substantial lunch for one shilling and sixpence. The General is not too dignified to go out and obtain for a customer a bottle of Guinness, if asked.

OFFICERS EXONERATED; PILOT WARNED.
MONTREAL, Dec. 19.—Judgement in the Dominion Wreck Commission's Court exonerated Captain William Whitehead and Chief Officer L. Halcrow from blame of stranding the Thompson liner Cairn Dhu in the St. Lawrence on November 21. Pilot Garispy argued, but owing to his good record he was only warned to be more careful.
