British Government Decide to Deport Communist Agitators

Cotton Strikes in India Assured of Moscow's Support--Princess Mafalda of Italy Married to Prince of Hesse--Labrador Boundary Case Next Spring.

BRITAIN TO DEPORT

COMMUNIST AGITATORS.
LONDON, Sept. 22. The Daily Mail says the British Government has taken determined action with a view to deporting all dangerous communist agitators.

MOSCOW AND INDIA'S

COTTON STRIKE.
BOMBAY, Sept. 23. The cotton strike which began September fifteenth, has grown rapidly and now involves one hundred and thirty-five thousand operatives. The strikers received a telegram purporting to come from the Soviet Workers Union of Moscow expressing fraternal solidarity and intimating that ten thousand rubles have been forwarded to assist the strike.

LABRADOR BOUNDARY CASE NEXT SPRING.

QUEBEC, Sept. 22. The Privy Council will be called upon to hear arguments in the Quebec Labrador case early next spring, and Premier Taschereau, Attorney General of the Province, will accompany Messrs. Charles LaCocq, K.C., Assistant Attorney General, and Alime Geoffroy, K.C., to look after the interests of this Province. It appears that all hopes of agreement between Canada and Newfoundland regarding rights on certain portions of the Labrador must be abandoned, and that the offer made by the last mentioned country is not found to be acceptable. Canadian legal lights are to take part in the case against Sir John Simon, who is counsel for Newfoundland. This is the last instance in which Sir John will act against the Province, as he has now been chosen as adviser in England.

PRINCE AT BUENOS AIRES.

BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 22. The Prince of Wales arrived at Buenos Aires last night on his return from Chile where for several days he had been held up by a heavy snow storm. He leaves to-morrow for Chapadmal, near Mar del Plata, where he will embark on Saturday aboard the Repulse for England.

SHANGHAI TO HAVE

120 EXECUTIONS.
SHANGHAI, Sept. 22. Twelve convicted Chinese were executed publicly to-day after a parade of the condemned. The parade and hangings were witnessed by thousands. The executions will continue at the rate of six daily until one hundred and eighty condemned men have been executed in accordance with the death sentences handed down by the mixed courts.

WEATHER KRIM'S BEST ALLY.

FEZ, Sept. 23. The rainy season and winter coming on space are Abd-el-Krim's most powerful allies, and the Moorish chieftain makes no secret of the fact in his appeals to his followers. On the other hand the French commander asserts that offers of submission continue to come in. The battle front situation remains unchanged.

GRANTED SPECIAL DISPENSATION.

ROME, Sept. 22. The Pope has granted a special dispensation for the marriage to-morrow of Princess Mafalda, of Italy, a Catholic, and Prince Philip of Hesse, a Lutheran, in consideration of a pledge that Mafalda remain firm in her faith and rear all her children as Catholics. Philip renounces his rights to the succession.

ITALIAN ROYAL WEDDING.

RACCONIGI, Italy, Sept. 22. With hallowed ritual that was beautifully simple, Princess Mafalda, the youthful second daughter of the ruling house of Italy, to-day became the bride of Philip, Prince of Hesse. Members of the royal families of Italy, Germany, Denmark, Greece, Rumania, Serbia, Belgium, Austria, Montenegro, and representatives of the dynasties of Great Britain and Spain witnessed the ceremony.

LONDON UNDER ATTACK.

LONDON, Sept. 22. Under lashing equinoctial gales and rain, fifty thousand soldiers of Britain were to-day sloping about some where in Wiltshire, engaged in a monster sham battle, in which one group attempted the invasion of the London area, and other sections are acting as defenders. The main armies are expected to clash on a 35-mile front in a day or two.

LLOYD GEORGE'S CHANCES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23. Lloyd George is expected by the British public to come back, if he vigorously takes up the matter of economic relief, better housing, and the liquor problem, according to Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, head of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, just back from Europe.

LUMBER VESSEL SUSPECTED OF

RUNNING.
NEW LONDON, Sept. 23. Suspected of carrying liquor beneath a two million feet cargo of lumber, the British four-masted schooner, Quaco Queen, of St. John, was brought into port by two coastguard patrol boats at dawn to-day. Her papers showed she was bound from St. John's, New York. A coastguard crew will be placed aboard the craft, which will be permitted to proceed to New York where she will be unloaded under supervision of the guardsmen.

THE HUDSON RAY RAILWAY.

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 23. The Free Press in its news columns to-day stated that the Minister of Railways has received a bid from a Winnipeg-St. Boniface syndicate for the purchase of the unfinished railway system from Hudson Bay Junction to Port Nelson with a promise that the deal goes through the line will be completed with private capital within two years and deep sea shipping facilities completed at terminus.

FLOWERS COMING HERE.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23. In lieu of a planned expedition to Newfoundland, postponed now until next year because of the close season, a Field Museum will leave here on October 1 for the Canadian Rockies to search for the white Rocky Mountain goat, the only existing species of wild mountain goat.

NEWFOUNDLANDER WINS HONORS AT QUEEN'S.

KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 23. Winfield H. Jennings, St. John's, Nfld., received a degree of Bachelor of Arts with honors to-day, following the final examinations at Queen's University.

CLAIMS HE DISCOVERED CANCER CURE.

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 23. Dr. W. T. Galbraith, veterinary surgeon, believes that after five years' experiments he has a cure for cancer. He was so sure his serum, called isstin, was efficacious, he inoculated himself with cancer germs last fall and is proceeding to cure it with isstin. He claims the serum has been a complete success on horses and animals.

TERN SCHOONERS COLLIDE.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Sept. 23. The tern schooners Frances J. Elkin, of Yarmouth, N.S., and Abbie C. Stubbs limped into port this evening after colliding in the Bay of Fundy in thick fog last night. The Elkin was bound from Parashoro, N.S., to New York, and the Stubbs from Fall River for Port Wade, N.S., in ballast.

FRENCH WAR DEBT COMMISSION

IN U. S. A.
NEW YORK, Sept. 23. Joseph Caillaux, Finance Minister of France, and ten colleagues, arrived to-day on their way to Washington to negotiate a settlement of the French war debt.

Modern Man is 15,000 Years Old

PROFESSOR PETRIE SAYS EUROPE WAS "WILD WEST" OF ASIA.

LONDON, Sept. 16. (A.P.)—Nearly fifteen thousand years ago people much like the modern men and women existed in Egypt, Professor Sir William Flinders Petrie declared at the British Association at Southampton. He explained that relics of a civilization known as the Badarian had been found in the Fayum basin of the Nile, and finds and pottery had been discovered of a date not later than thirteen thousand years before Christ. Skulls found were precisely like those of modern men and women. "If the evidence is substantiated," he added, "and I see no possibility of getting over it, we shall have to wipe the slate and start at a much earlier age than anything previously known with an advanced form of the human type."

"The Badarian civilization was widespread and covered a long period, certainly two or three thousand years. Metal grinding stones which have been found indicate that the people were agriculturists. This period was the real start of civilization in Egypt. There is no doubt that civilization came from the East, and that Europe was the 'Wild West' of Asiatic civilization."

A Tumorous Growth

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—As a regular reader of your paper, I have been struck with the broad and open mindedness brought to bear on the various topics with which you deal. I have followed with interest, for example, your efforts to bring about improvements in our educational system. It is this force of education which, interwoven with that of religion, has made civilization what it is to-day. That our civilization is extremely faulty it is unnecessary to say, but if we hope to achieve further advancement it is imperative that these two powers be unhindered. There is, unfortunately, in our midst at work an element that acts as a strong counter current and does much to check the beneficial influence of that combined force. That drawback is a tumorous sectarianism in our particular form of religion. It must be some what bewildering to the so called heathen people to listen to the diverse doctrines of christianity propounded, but what I have more particularly in mind is the evil effects of the spirit that sectarianism has engendered in the common people. It is rampant in social and political circles and doing untold harm, but surely it is not so deeply rooted in the minds of intelligent men and women that it is going to be allowed to interfere with our material progress. It is a well known fact that an occasional employer will engage only servants belonging to a particular sect. This policy is highly detrimental and luckily rare, perhaps, but it is to be hoped that in our country where new industries, such as the Humber are opening up, that prejudice of this sort will be shunned and a lead given to the sane thought that bigotry is incompatible with progress intellectually, spiritually and industrially. It has been openly said that Christianity has failed and with greater caution, that the Church has failed. It is strange that anyone capable of thinking should have misgivings in that direction, or have doubts that the instruments of the Church, which is so divided and broken, are failing to measure up to the task of endeavouring to eradicate even minor ailments attacking the faith they have adopted? Grand Bank Notes

On Friday, Sept. 18th, an illustrated lecture on "Our Mission Field in West China" was given by our pastor, Mr. Currie, under the auspices of the Young People's League. The lecture was one of interest to all, as it revealed to us the great advances that are being made by our missionaries. Under their influence, not only are the moral conditions of China improving rapidly, but also social and business conditions are being transformed and are taking on a semblance of Western civilization. China is awakening after a long sleep of centuries; her old institutions, beliefs and superstitions are being shaken. The future will reveal to us whether China will be influenced by those evils of Western politics, and by its greed for power become a menace to the world or not. The only thing that is likely to prevent it is by instilling into Chinese life and character those principles upon which true empire is founded—those principles of justice and democracy which have made the British Empire the greatest in the world. The future peace of the world depends to a large extent upon the readiness of those ancient nations to accept the principles laid down by Christ and work them out in their national life.

It is encouraging to know that the bank and shore fishery has been such a success. Most of our vessels have obtained from 2,500 to 4,500 qts. of fish so far.

Capt. John Thornhill is now landing 1,200 qts., which gives him a total of 4,500 qts. this year.

Most of the fish has been cured and several cargoes have reached the other side. Several vessels are loading fish for Oporto now.

The coastal service has improved considerably during the past year which is a great convenience compared with the poor service of former years.

The Halifax boats are doing a brisk trade. The "Skipper" discharged and received 1,400 packages at Grand Bank on her last call.

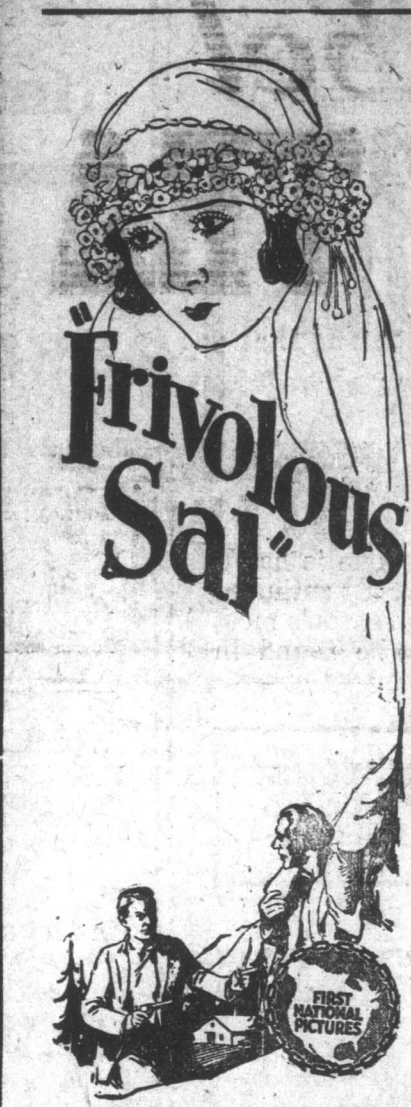

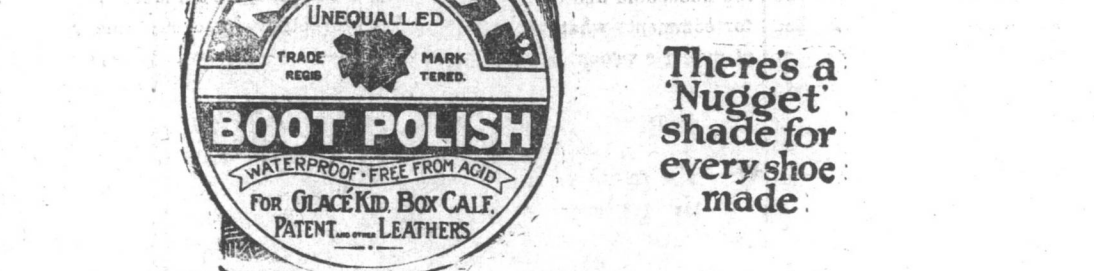
