

MENT.-A Bill has passed the Senate of the United States, legalizing contracts expressly payable in coin. The effect of should it pass the Lower House, will be the partial repeal of the legal-tender haw, and to make gold again, so far as parties may contract to do so, the medium of exchange and standard of payment This is one mode of returning to specie payment, in so far as the people may vol-untarily choose to do so, with regard to all future monetary transactions. It will have no unimportant bearing upon commercial transactions between Canada and the United States ; and on that account

Canadian dealers with the Americans can not but be anxious that the bill should pass the House of Representatives.

The Companies are each about fifty strong, and were out for Com-pany parade to day; to-morrow they will commence Battalion drill at the Scotch Glube. We have to add that the Guelph Mechanics' Institute, has been thrown open to the Volunteers dur-ing their stay in town, and that they will be allowed all the priviloges of members.

FALL WHEAT .- Mr. R. L. Campbell of Erin yesterday-brought us a sample of wheat of extraordinary length. The field as sown last year with Glasgow spring wheat, and seeded down in clover. The hay this year is a most luxuriant crop Throughout the field there are bunche of wheat growing, and it was one of these Mr. Campbell showed us. The stalks are five feet in length, and from apparently two or three seeds forty stalks have sprung.
