Austin, Texas, July 25 .- Further sub-

tantiation of the report from Tuxpan, Mexico, of the death a few days ago at that place of Jose Calvario, an Aztec Indian, at an age lacking only 15 years of the two-century mark, was ontained in a letter received here today from Frank L. Watson, an American mining man, of Colima, Mexico. "I was at Tuxpan on the day Cal-vario died," he writes. "I had seen the old man walking about the streets of the town many times, and he was often ointed out to me as being nearly 200 ears old. So interested were the state fficials in the report of the great age of the man that a special commission was appointed to investigate the claim.

The records of the parish church show that he was born in 1727. He left several thousand descendants. He often told his friends in a joking manner that he had the largest family of any man in the world. No one knows how many times he was married, but it is commonly reported that he took his last wife unto himself when he was past the age of 150 years, and that he

had several children by her "Calvario was an Aztec Indian. His rules of living were simple. In fact, he observed no set rules. He ate what ver he liked, and, of course, his povery prevented him from faring very amptuously. He was a moderate drinker of native liquors for 165 years, according to his own statment, made nany times to friends, and his memory began smoking the Mexican hand-made

"This Methusaleh of modern times vas the walking historian for this part of Mexico covering the period of his ong life. He was born and lived within the shadow of Mt. Colima. He was a witness to the destruction Tuxpan by an earthquake in 1886, when over 1,000 people were killed. The man was of striking physical appearance and piercing. During the later years of his life he gained a livelihood by ing odd jobs around town.'
