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MIDDLESEX ENDEAVORS.

Meet Here and Form a County Convention.

The Outside Delegates—Thirty or More Societies Represented—Sunrise Prayer Meeting—Interesting Papers on Endeavor Work—Officers Elected.

Yesterday was a field day in the history of local Christian Endeavorers, being the first convention of the 30 or more Christian Endeavor societies in Middlesex county. Promptly at 7 o'clock in the morning a sunrise prayer meeting was held in the Sunday school of the First Congregational Church, when more than 200 young people turned out, and filled the room to overflowing.

Mr. A. J. Clark, president of the London Local Union, led the meeting, and seated with him on the platform were Messrs. Philip and Aylward. A great many of those present took part and helped to make the service of prayer and praise bright and inspiring, a fit preparation for the earnest work to follow.

All day long the members of the Reception Committee were at the railway stations meeting the different trains and welcoming the delegates who came in from all parts of the county and directing them to the Congregational Church, where all the sessions of the convention were held.

After Rev. G. B. Sage, vice-president of the Provincial Union, opened the proceedings with a prayer and prayer service. Seated on the platform with the chairman were: Rev. Dr. Dickson, of Galt, president of the Provincial Union; Rev. Wm. A. Cook, of Dorchester; Rev. P. K. Dayfoot, Baptist minister of Stratford; and Rev. M. T. Talling. A choir chosen from the different city societies led the singing.

After Rev. Mr. Fowler had led in prayer the report of the Business Committee was read and adopted, it being unanimously resolved to organize a county union.

Rev. Wm. A. Cook, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Dorchester, was introduced, and gave an address on "The Pledge," bringing out and emphasizing the fact that we must have before us a single object and aim in life if we are to do anything for Christ and his church. Miss Eliza Gault, of St. Thomas, read a splendid and exhaustive paper on "Faithfulness to the Pledge," which was well received.

Raycroft, Granton; Rev. W. A. Cook and Miss Cook, D. Ross, Geo. D. Durand, Jos. Bonnell, A. E. Talbot, Miss McKay, Miss Durand, W. E. Wilson, Jos. Woodin and Samuel Woods, Dorchester; S. Strachan and Miss M. B. Harkness, Belmont; Hugh Leitch, Angus McNeil and Miss B. L. Hannah, Glenora; Rev. P. K. Dayfoot, Stratford; Sam Tacka, Galt; John A. Smith, Galt; Miss M. Baker and H. Temple, St. James Park, postoffice; A. B. Findlay, Byron; W. C. Ferguson, London.

The evening session was opened with a service of praise at 7:30, followed by reports from the local societies, viz: Adelaide Street Baptist, Talbot Street Baptist, First Congregational, St. Paul's Episcopal, Memorial Episcopal, St. George's Episcopal, St. Matthew's Episcopal, Centennial Methodist, St. Andrew's Presbyterian, First Presbyterian, Knox Presbyterian, King Street Presbyterian, St. James Presbyterian; also from the Parkhill Methodist, Dorchester Presbyterian and Granton Presbyterian.

Dr. Dickson was then called on for an address on "Christian Endeavor and the Regeneration of Modern Life." It was elevating and soul-inspiring, and nothing would give local Endeavorers greater pleasure than to have the privilege of hearing Dr. Dickson again.

Rev. W. J. Ford, Methodist minister of Parkhill, gave a carefully-studied and very instructive address on Bible study, after which the convention was closed with a consecration service conducted by Dr. Dickson.
