Major Addie and Ensign Leckie, of
the 2nd Army Medical Battalion, England,
started meetings in London. It is al-
most too much to realize that our
Canadian Army has been brought to
its present standard of development
and efficiency in such a short space
of time. Had the whole period been
spent in discovering whether our meth-
ods would be acceptable or not, but
would not have seemed too long, but
our pioneers save people no time to
think about methods. Today we are
conducting permanently organized
meetings in no less than 531 places.
We have a soldiery of many thou-
sands; members, no less than 841 offi-
cers of whom 102 are accepted candi-
dates.

—The Springfield, Mo., Daily Repub-
lican of Sept. 15 has the following refer-
ence to a former Londoner, who died in
that city: M. J. Redmond died at his
residence, No. 223 West Center street,
at 4 p.m. Saturday. Deceased had
been in the employ of T. J. Moss, the
city engineer, for the past
three years, and was well and fav-
orably known in this city. For the
eight years prior to his service in
that company he was in the employ
of the Kansas and Texas Coal Com-
pany. He had charge of the Moss
and Timber Company's business at
Huntington, Ark., and later at Spar-
tanburg, Mo., and afterwards at Flem-
ing, Mo., and Paris, Tenn. At the
time of his death he was vice-president
of the Bank of Nangan, of which his
uncle, J. J. Redmond, is president.

of his death. Deceased was born at
London, Canada, in 1853, where his re-
latives now reside. His sister, Miss
Mary Redmond, arrived from that place
about one week ago, and was present
at the time of his death. He leaves a
wife and two children—one 2 and the
other 4 years old.
