

The

Board of Education Will Make No Reductions.

Normal School Agreement Adopted With Slight Change-Tribute to Mr. Merchant.

The board of education met last night to consider the 'question of teachers' salaries and the proposed Normal School agreement. The report of the special committee re salaries, submitted by Dr. English (chairman),

was as follows: "That the present scheme regulating the salaries of teachers in the city schools is satisfactory, and would re-

commend that no change be made. "Your committee wish to place on record a few of the facts which led them to this conclusion, for the information of public school supporters:

"(1) The average salary paid to female teachers in London in 1898 was \$346, while the average salary paid in other cities in the same year was \$425.

"(2) The maximum salary paid to female teachers in London is \$500. There are only 16 female teachers out of a staff of 130 now receiving the maximum salary. No teacher receiving this salary has been in the employment of the board less than 15 years, and some have served the pub-

lic in London 30 years.

"(3) The annual increase of \$20 in the salary of female teachers is a continual incentive to good work, and is preferable to a larger advance every

five years.

"(4) If the teachers in the employment of the board in any given year remained until they attained the maxi-mum salary the scheme would be an mum salary the scheme would be an ever-increasing burden on the taxpayer. But it was found on comparison of the list of teachers employed in 1888 with that of 1898, that out of a staff of 66 teachers in the former year only 34 of them remained in the service of the board in 1898. Of the 32 teachers at the minimum salary of ten years mentioned some were re-ceiving \$400. Their places were filled by promotion from the staff, and other teachers at the minimum sala ry of \$275 were employed to fill the vacan-

The report was adopted as read. THE NORMAL SCHOOL.

The proposed agreement with the government for the use of a public school for normal school work was also adopted as submitted by the committee. The city will ask \$1,500 a year for the privilege instead of \$1,000, as originally proposed. An amendment by Mr. MacRobert, seconded by Mr. Morgan, to make the term of the agreement five years instead of ten, was lost. Mr. MacRobert gave notice of motion for reconsideration. Then followed a pleasant incident.

"F. W. Merchant, Esq., B.A., Principal Collegiate Institute, London:
"The members of the board of edu-

cation of the city of London accept with deep regret your resignation as principal of its Collegiate Institute. But while we regret the step which you have seen fit to take, we are proud of the fact that you have severed your connection with it in order to take the principalship of a higher educational institution in the Province of Ontario. "We are well aware that when you were made principal of our institute, its standing was very low among the institutes of the province—scarcely, in fact, recognized. Now we rejoice in the face that among the institutes of the province and in the Dominion ours has the proud distinction of standing among the first, if not the very first. Its attendance during the time has

increased from 300 to 700 or over-a marvelous growth-while the city of London throughout the length and breadth of this province stands as one. of the chief educational centers of the province. Consequently we recognize the fact that it is to your untiring and increasing efforts, to your execu-tive and administrative abilities that this proud position in which our institute now stands has been attained. "Therefore, while we are compelled to accept your resignation, we do so with the satisfaction of knowing that while you were in our employ your duties were always well and conscientiously performed, and we only hope
