out. Mrs. Garside had three ribs
broken. Potter had a rib broken and
was cut about the head.

—The Toronto members of the In-

—The Woodstock Sentinel-Review
says: So far as is yet known, the late
Robert Bird, Q.C., left no will. A dis-
tinct search was made Tuesday after-
noon by friends, and was continued in
the afternoon, but in vain. It is almost
inconceivable that a legal man and a
man of business like Mr. Bird should
not have made a will, which would
have enabled his heirs to wind up the
estate much more economically than
if none existed. The estate is believed
to be a good one, amounting probably
to from \$50,000 to \$60,000. It is known
that apart from his real estate, which
is considerable, he held securities,
chiefly mortgages, to the value of
\$40,000 or \$50,000.

—Mr. William York, who resides
near Belmont, must be convinced that
some dark-eyed Nemesis has recently
been hovering about his home. Some
time ago, at a barn-raising on his farm
a man was severely injured. The day
after, Mrs. York fell down cellar and
broke her leg. Later the same day, a
carpenter who was working there hap-
pened to be on the same spot that was
chosen by a sledge that fell from the
barn. He was knocked senseless. To
the ordinary mind it would appear
that enough fractures and injuries
had been received for one family, but
they did not cease then. Shortly af-
terwards Mr. York fell off a load of
hay and broke his arm, and one day
last week a son, aged 9, fell 28 feet out
of that same barn and broke his arm,
besides injuring himself in other ways.

DEATH OF JOHN C. COUGHLIN.

Mr. John C. Coughlin, one of the best
known and most popular men in the
vicinity of London, died at 10 o'clock
last night, at the family residence,
Glanworth. For many years Mr. Cough-
lin had been one of the leading cattle
men of Ontario. In carrying on his
business he made very many friends
throughout the country, who will be
grieved indeed to learn of his death.
He is survived by a widow and a fam-
ily of seven sons, grown to manhood.
Messrs. Timothy and Daniel Coughlin
are brothers, and Miss HERRA Cough-
lin, of this city, and Mrs. Doyle, of
St. Thomas, are sisters.

AT NIAGARA FALLS

London Retail Grocers and Their
Friends Enjoy Their Annual Out-
ing—A Fast Trip and a Pleasant
Time.

Yesterday morning's unfavorable
weather doubtless prevented many
London people from attending the an-
nual excursion to Niagara Falls of the
London Retail Grocers. In spite of
the fact that only 225 went from Lon-
don, the excursion was a decided suc-
cess, as enough passengers were picked
up at St. Thomas and Tilsonburg to
increase the total number to 567. A
pleasant day was spent by the excu-
sionists, some in inspecting the many
points of interest around the Falls,
and others in making the trip to Buf-
falo. The Michigan Central provided
a train of seven cars for the excursion
—one baggage, two chair cars, two
vestibule, and the remainder first-class
passenger coaches—and this extra ac-
commodation added greatly to the
pleasure of the picnicers. The train
left at 7:25 a.m. and arrived at Ni-
agara Falls at 10:47, making the run
of almost 130 miles in three hours and
twenty-two minutes. Conductor C.
Labell, Engineer J. Cottrell and Fire-
man Yokum, of St. Thomas, were in
charge. On the return journey the
train left the Falls at 8:20, and arrived
in London at 11:45. Short distances of
the journey were covered in very fast
time. From Wyndham to Tilsonburg,
23 miles, was traveled in 18 minutes,
which is equal to 77 miles an hour, and
between Hawtry and Port Dover, a
distance of two miles, the train trav-
eled at the rate of 80 miles an hour.
The committee having the arrange-
ments in charge expressed themselves
as perfectly satisfied with the service
provided by the M. C. R.

NEW SUPPLY OF FIRE HOSE

For the City Received and Tested—
Several Other Matters Dealt With
by No. 3 Committee.

Of the past three meetings of No. 3
committee, minority reports have been
submitted to the council, but last night
Chairman Plant, Ald. Ross, Garratt,
Jenkins, Wray, Acting-Mayor Brenner
were present, together with Secretary
Bell, Engineer Graydon, Chief Roe, In-
spector Bell and Market Clerk Wilson.
Chief Roe reported the receipt of the
new supply of Keystone hose, and of a
satisfactory test that had been made.
The circumstances connected with the
award of the contract will be remem-
bered. The new hose weighs 3½
pounds more than the sample that was
sent to Engineer Graydon by the rival
company, into whose hands it went ac-
cidentally. There was a shortage of
three feet. The report was filed for
reference.

A consideration of the matter of pro-
perly guarding premises in the neigh-
borhood of the Queen City Oil Company
was occasioned by a protest from Mr.
Charles Moorhead. He claimed that
the company was not living up to its
agreement. Chief Roe, Engineer Gray-
don and Chairman Plant will inspect
the property and report. Mr. Moor-
head has been notified that his insur-
ance will be increased in view of ex-
isting conditions.

Inspector Regan made further com-
plaints about the unsatisfactory work
of Messrs. Baldwin & Baldwin and
McNeill, street watering contractors.
The matter of the proposed scavenger
system was referred back to the board
of health, to draft a scheme in con-
junction with the city engineer.
A new veranda on the market house
will be built by Maurice Inwood for
\$345. The tenders ranged from \$345 to
\$558.

Engineer Graydon will furnish a re-
port of the cost of thoroughly reme-
dying the condition of the fish market
floors.

The council will be recommended to
allot James Terry a space on the walk
surrounding the market house on pay-
ment of \$2 per month.

HIT WITH A SHOVEL

John Gray's Face Severely Cut in a
Fight With Willis Moxley.

While Willis Moxley, of Grey street,
and John Gray, of 446 Hill street, were
driving home in a wagon yesterday af-
ternoon, they became involved in a
spirited argument. At the corner of
Colborne and Simcoe streets they broke
the board seat of the wagon in half,
and with the aid of the pieces of
board, continued the argument. Mox-
ley, finding that Gray was getting the
best of it, grabbed a scarp shovel
from the bottom of the wagon and
struck his antagonist a vicious blow
across the face, inflicting a nasty cut
across the upper lip, which required
several stitches to close. Both men
had been drinking, and had been re-
fused liquor at several hotels before
their disagreement. Moxley was ar-
rested about 6:30 by P. C. Greene and
P. C. Woolway. Gray will be unable
to appear against Moxley for several
days. Moxley has an unenviable police
court record. Moxley appeared in the
police court this morning, and was
bailed to appear on Saturday. Moxley's
version of the affair is to the effect
that Gray received his injuries by
falling from the wagon.

FATAL SCOTCH.

Toronto, July 26.—Patrick G. Close,
for many years a prominent citizen,
died yesterday under peculiar circum-
stances. About two weeks ago he was
bitten in the neck by a mosquito, and
scratched the spot until the blood
came. A few days afterwards he be-
gan to show symptoms of blood poi-
soning, and died as stated. Mr. Close
was a wholesale grocer in his ear-
lier years, and about 20 years ago be-
came interested in real estate. Later-
ly he had been a member of the as-
sessment court of revision. He sat in
the city council for some years.

FAVORABLE VERDICT

Returned by Coroner's Jury in the In-
quest into the Death of Lily Errol's
Child—Criminal Proceedings Will,
However, Be Instituted.

The inquest into the death on Sat-
urday, July 14, of the infant child of
Lily Errol, which was adjourned from
the night of Monday, July 16, was con-
cluded at the police court last night.
Several additional witnesses were ex-
amined. The jury brought in the fol-
lowing verdict: "We find that the in-
fant came to her death from either suf-
focation or hemorrhage, or both, due
to want of attention at time of birth.
We find no evidence to incriminate the
mother of having intentionally caused
the death of the child. The girl, who
is only 19 years of age, is still in the
hospital, but is recovering. Criminal
proceedings will be instituted against
her when she recovers, but what the
precise charge will be has not yet been
decided upon by the crown authori-
ties.

WALKERTON OLD BOYS.

Walkerton, July 26.—The opening
day of the old boys' reunion here Tues-
day was in many respects a great
success. Former residents of Walkert-
on turned up from all parts of the
continent, and even Australia and
South Africa were represented. The
streets were handsomely decorated
with arches and bunting. Unfortu-
nately the proceedings were somewhat
marred by a heavy rain which fell
during the afternoon. It cleared up
long enough to enable the parade to
be held through the streets, but a por-
tion of the programme had to be dis-
pensd with. The speaking took place
in the building on the exhibition

grounds. Speeches were made by
Mayor Stalker, Hon. Adam Brown, of
Hamilton, pioneer of Wellington, Grey
and Bruce Railway; Thos. Adair, who
built the first house in Walkerton;
Henry Gargill, M.P. R. Trunk, M.P.,
Alec Shaw, ex-M.P., Warden Cum-
mings and W. A. Skeans, of Toronto. A
concert was given in the town hall in
the evening by the 48th Highlanders'
Band, Toronto.
