TIN MILLS IDLE.

New Castle, Aug. 5.—The Shenango plant of the American Tinplate Company, the largest tin plate mill in the world, has shut down for an indefinite period. The Green mill, of the same company, next largest in size, will shut down next week. None of the officials of the big plants can give any information as to how soon they will resume.

The Shenango is a 30-mill plant, while the Greer mill is 20 mills. Only the hot mill department of the Shenango closed. The tin house will operate for some days on unfinished work, but the entire establishment will be closed within two weeks. About 3,-000 men are employed in the big mills. The shut down of the Shenango mill follows the action of the men employed there in voting last Saturday to refuse the proffered reduction of 25 per cent on export orders. The workers are greatly incensed at the shut down, claiming it is in retaliation. The local management says the shut down is due solely to the stagnation of the tin mar-

Marion, Ind., Aug. 5.-The Marion plant of the American Tinplate Com-pany, employing 500 men, has been ordered closed on account of the refusal of the workmen to accept a reduction of 25 per cent in their wages during the filling of a big order for the Standard Oil Company.

Word was received from the national headquarters of the organization in Pittsburg, to the effect that orders would probably go out from the combine offices closing every one of its plants at which the workers rejected




