

'Winnipeg's High Tax Rate.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 5.—As the net estimates for the city of Winnipeg now stand the total amount to be raised is \$696,170 54. The rate of taxation proposed is 24.33 mills on the dollar. This rate will raise \$692,738 42. Council will therefore have to prune their estimates by the amount of \$3,432 12, or make a slight increase in the rate. the Relief Stations.

Strike Has Cost Over \$65,000,000-Now in the 12th Week-Trouble at Fernie Mine Settled.

#### COST OF THE STRIKE.

Wilkesbarre, Aug. 5.-At the end of the twelfth week of the strike the estimated losses and costs are as follows, a new item being added, the cost of the troops now in the field, at the rate of \$5,000 a day:

Loss to operators in price of coal ......\$29,500,000 Loss to strikers in wages ...... 13,500,000 Loss to workers made idle ...... 3,600,000

Loss to business men in coal regions...... 9,500,000

Loss to other business men .... 5,500,000
Cost of maintaining non-union men ...... Damage to mines and machinery ..... 2,500,000

Loss by lace mills strike ..... 100,000 Cost to state of placing troops in field.... 15,000

Charleston, W. Va., Aug. 5.-Supplies are being regularly issued to the men on strike throughout this mining district, from four different stations, Montgomery, Cedar Grove, Sewell and Glen Jean. These are the central points and to them the miners and members of their families flock, to go on the surface to indicate anything, home laden with the necessaries of life. TIN MILLS IDLE. New Castle, Aug. 5.-The Shenango plant of the American Tinplate Com-pany, the largest tin plate mill in the world, has shut down for an indefinite period. The Green mill, of the same company, next largest in size, will shut down next week. None of the officials of the big plants can give any information as to how soon they will

The Shenango is a 30-mill plant while the Greer mill is 20 mills. Only the hot mill department of the Shen ango closed. The tin house will operate for some days on unfinished work, but the entire establishment will be closed within two weeks. About 3,-000 men are employed in the big mills. The shut down of the Shenango mill follows the action of the men employed there in voting last Saturday to refuse the proffered reduction of 25 per cent on export orders. The workers are greatly incensed at the shut down, claiming it is in retaliation. The local management says the shut down is due solely to the stagnation of the tin mar-

Marion, Ind., Aug. 5.-The Marion plant of the American Tinplate Company, employing 500 men, has been ordered closed on account of the refusal of the workmen to accept a reduction of 25 per cent in their wages during the filling of a big order for the Standard Oil Company. Word was received from the national



#### Low Fares in Cleveland.

Cleveland, Aug. 5.-The circuit court has dissolved the injunction recently issued by Judge Caldwell, restraining the city council from granting public service franchises, especially those giving the low fare street railway company the right to use the streets Mayor Johnson fought the injunction suit, and as a result of his victory today the low fare lines will probably be constructed as soon as possible Judge Marvin, who read the decision of the court, said in part: "The council is conclusively a legislative body.
