NO DOUBLE TRACKING

Stanley Street Too Narrow to Allow It.

Motion to Initiate Tar Macadam on King Street Adopted by Council.

Tenders for Altering City Hall Will Be Called For, as No One Wants to Buy It—Ald. Cooper's Endeavor to Hamper the City Engineer a Failure.

The city council last night made 60 minutes' business spin out to consume nearly three hours. The proposal to double-track Stanley street was given a solar plexus blow. The city engineer was given entire control of his department, despite the fact that Ald. Cooper lifted up his voice and protested. The King street tar macadam pavement will be advertised on the initiative. Several communications concerning proposed legislation were dealt with summarily and referred to committees. The resolution for the city engineer to raise above the dead level of monotony.

The members present were Mayor Ald. Cooper, Ald. Duggan, Jolly, McMechan, Campbell, Abram, Winnett, Stevely, Douglass, and Beattie, and Acting City Clerk Bell.

COMMUNICATIONS.
The following communications were received and dealt with:
W. H. Bartram wrote protesting against the action of the council in fixing certain taxes on the property, 531 Dundas street, by L. K. Cameron. Referred to No. 1 committee.

The Anchor Baseball Club applied for the use of the city hall on March 14 for a concert and dance. Referred to city treasurer.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association asked the co-operation of the London council to secure an amendment of the municipal act. Referred to No. 1 committee.

Referred to No. 2 committee were: Fred W. Crabbe and 23 other residents of Stanley street petitioned against allowing the street railway to lay double tracks or a switch on that street. The road was laid over the side of the street, and the reading of No. 2 committee's report.

Referred to No. 1—Metropolitan Manufacturing Company, re personal property taxes; John Mann & Sons, re sale of part of York street adjoining their premises; Florence M. Macnamara, re grant of \$100 to Protestant Orphans' Home; P. B. Richards, Jas. Ryan, Elizabeth Moffat and Susan Elliott for remission of taxes; Hy. Wilcox, re application for South African service watch; Alex. M. Ford for grant to Trades and Labor demonstration; Catherine Rudd, taxes.

Referred to No. 2—Mrs. Ann Combs, re ownership of property on Talbot street.
To No. 3—George Gray et al., for inclosure of vacant lots, re proposed Webster for position of street watering inspector; R. A. Haylock, for position as fireman; S. J. Allin, for watering of Hamilton road, Mamelon to Rectory street.

To Manufacturers' Committee.—Deering Harvester Company, the Valley City and Canning Company, Port Hope Preserving and Canning Company, re starting branches here.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.
The report of No. 3 committee was carried without discussion or amendment.

The first three clauses of the report of No. 2 committee passed without discussion. On the fourth clause, providing that the city engineer be made the Ontario Government for a grant in aid of repairing or remodeling the West London breakwater, and making a permanent structure, Ald. Cooper asked for information, and Ald. Winnett explained that as the city was already spending \$1,000 per year on the breakwater, it might as well get the 25 per cent, which the government was willing to grant. The clause carried.

THAT TAR MACADAM.
The clause recommending no further action on the petition of the people of King street on petition of ratepayers, but that the proposed construction of a bituminous macadam pavement be advertised under the local improvement clauses of the municipal act on the initiative, brought Ald. McMechan to his feet. He moved in amendment that the late Ald. Cooper be struck out. The people of King street had had tar macadam thrust upon them all last year, but they were not to have it again. He can help it. He advocated waiting till the frost is out of the ground so as to learn the condition of the tar macadam on Queen's avenue. Ald. McMechan, on the opinion of Engineer Rust, of Toronto, that tar macadam was a good pavement for residential streets only, and said that as King street was subject to heavy traffic the pavement would not be suitable.

Ald. Winnett, Duggan and Cooper spoke strongly in favor of the pavement, and urged going on with the work. The amendment lost. Ald. Douglass called for the yeas and nays, which were given as follows: Yeas—Ald. Douglass, Winnett, McMechan and Abram—4.
Nays—Beattie, Stevely, Jolly, Duggan, Cooper and Gerry—7.

The clause providing for a temporary office in the city hall for the medical health officer, was carried.

NO DOUBLE TRACK.
The next clause of the report was as follows:
"That the London Street Railway Company be granted permission to lay double tracks on Stanley street, to enable them to operate the Springbank, in lieu of laying switches on said street, which they have power to do."

Ald. Beattie's motion to give the city engineer entire control of his department during 1902, and to make him responsible for all work and expenditures, was carried. The motion was carried by a large majority.

Ald. Beattie explained for the information of the public generally that, although the city solicitor's opinion was that an anti-spitting-by-law would not be legal, that did not imply that the company had not the right to prohibit spitting in their cars.

Ald. Beattie pointed out the importance to London of opposing such legislation in connection with the proposed Port Stanley electric railway. He said that the city solicitor's opinion was that the city had the right to make connection with each other without obtaining the consent of the municipalities.

to do under sub-section 6 of section 50 of bylaw No. 916; such track not to be deemed laying down of new lines or an extension of tracks within the meaning of section 21 of said bylaw. The work to be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

A large deputation of Stanley street residents, headed by Messrs. George White, Hugh McLean, D. A. McLeod, W. H. Weston, and Dr. James D. Wilson, appeared to oppose the passing of the clause. They pointed out the narrowness of the street and the impossibility of having any vehicular traffic if the additional track was put down. Before the clause was mentioned as an alternative route.

In reply to a question from one of the aldermen, Manager Carr said that it would cost about \$25,000 to put a street railway bridge across the river on the Wharfside road. The alderman replied that Engineer Graydon had estimated that an ordinary bridge could be built for \$12,000, and a railway bridge should not more.

Mr. Carr answered that the bridge would have a span of 375 feet, necessitating two piers in the river.

Ald. Winnett said it was a preposterous idea to speak of laying another track.

Ald. McMechan spoke in the same strain, and moved that the privilege be not granted.

Ald. Beattie, who followed, quoted figures showing the total width of the street to be only 34 feet 11 1/2 inches, deducting the width of car tracks and ditches, the road space on the north side would be only 5 feet 2 inches, and on the south side 8 feet 3 inches. It would be absurd, he said, to allow the additional track to be laid.

In the vote which followed, seven voted against the laying of the track, and none voted for it. The matter of putting in a switch was referred back to committee.

OTHER REPORTS.
The clause recommending purchase of stone up to 300 cords carried.

The recommendation to supply each wagon with a horse, wagon and harness was defeated.

A title sewer on Wellington street, from Pall Mall to Hyman street, will be advertised for under the initiative.

No. 1 committee's report was passed without amendment, save that an error of two feet in frontage was rectified by refunding excess payment. The last clause of the report was to the effect that no tenders had been received for the purchase of the city hall, police station or registry office.

The report of the manufacturers' committee was adopted without amendment.

INQUIRIES.
Ald. Campbell asked if anything had been done with the recommendation of last year's council in the provision of new incinerator hospital. The lease for the present premises has almost expired.

The chairman of No. 2 committee replied that nothing had yet been done, but that the committee would take up the matter at once.

MOTIONS.
Ald. Winnett submitted a petition from Toronto city council, re opposing the Bell Telephone Company's securing of legislation to increase their rates, and moved that it be referred to No. 1 committee with power. The motion carried.

Ald. Beattie submitted a communication from Toronto city council, asking the council of London to join with Toronto in opposing legislation which would give electric railways the right to make connection with each other without obtaining the consent of the municipalities.
