Jacobs broke his record twice, for he cleared the bar at 11 feet 10 inches before his final performance. He won the pole vault easily, and on his first exhibition trial he vaulted this height with easily six inches to spare. The mark was measured by the officials and the standards raised on mats to allow the attempt at 12 feet 3 inches.

The remarkable height of the bar looked like an impossibility, but Jacobs got a perfect start and just cleared the bar, five inches higher than his previous performance and seven inches higher than the previous world's indoor record held by himself. The athlete was given an ovation by the
