Water Commissioners Will Tack-
on 25 Per Cent in Certain
Instances.

At a meeting of the water commis-
sioners on Saturday afternoon a mo-
tion by Commissioner Pooec, that all
persons outside the city limits using
city water, who are not less than
\$15 per quarter, be charged 25 per cent
more than citizens pay, carried unani-
mously, and it was further decided to
add to the motion a clause that the
commissioners now have the power to
cut off the supply at any time there is
a shortage.

The motion offered a simple solu-
tion to letters of complaint received
regarding present charges. The Engring
Manufacturing Company wrote stating
that they were being charged a double
rate at present, and did not think it
was fair, as nearly all their employees
live in the city, and all the money paid
out by the firm is spent here.

ing his rates.

ACCOMMODATE THE CITY**

Waterworks Superintendent Will
Retain Office Until Successor
Is Appointed.

At the water commissioners meeting
on Saturday afternoon Engineer Moore,
notified the commissioners that his
term expired on Jan. 31, but stated
that at their request he had consented
to continue on until some arrange-
ments were made on condition that
his salary ceases on Feb. 1. The com-
missioners decided to accept this pro-
position, and a meeting will be ar-
ranged shortly with the members of
No. 1 committee to arrange for the
appointment of an engineer to look
after all the engineering work of the
city.

at present enjoy there. The account
is now at the Bank of Toronto. It
was suggested that the chairman in-

attendance on them. It deals with the
family life of the Baxters. Mrs. Bax-
ter is a highly organized mollusc. In
getting others to do her work she has
become a genius. A very pretty gov-
erness is a member of the household,
and she finds the duty of doing
everything for her.

After the house is done properly, Tom
Kemp, Mrs. Baxter's brother, played
by Sir Charles, returns from Colorado,
and finding the condition of affairs,
attempts to cure his sister of her
trouble. He is completely routed at
first. The woman's husband has be-
gun to rely on his own strength, and
gradually has fallen in love with her.
Kemp is also smitten by her charms.
He sows the seeds of jealousy in Mrs.
Baxter's mind, and eventually cured of
her "molluscousness."

Miss Vine as the Mollusc was
beyond criticism. As a piece of char-
acter acting it was a gem. Miss Dor-
othy Thomas played the governess in
a most charming manner. Sam Sothen,
as the long-suffering husband, there was
an artistic restraint. There was not
an exaggerated note.

The audience was the largest and
